### NASCC INSTRUCTION 5090.1D

Subj: FACILITY RESPONSE AND DISCHARGE PREVENTION PLAN

1. Purpose. Provide a contingency plan, responsibilities, and response procedures for the control and cleanup of oil and hazardous substance spills (OHS) within the jurisdiction of Naval Air Station Corpus Christi (NASCC) in accordance with references (a) and (h).

2. Cancellation. NASCCINST 5090.1C. This instruction is a complete revision and should be read in its entirety.

3. Scope. This plan is effective for land, water, and resources under authority of Commanding Officer NASCC. The plan is applicable for OHS spills into the air, water, or land, that originate from any NASCC department, tenant activity, private contractor working within property boundaries, or any other organization.

#### 4. Background

a. A variety of hazardous substances (HS) are stored and used in small quantities at NASCC to support routine operations. Reference the NASCC Hazardous Waste Management Plan to establish specific contingency planning and response requirements to better control and/or reduce the harmful effects (e.g., environmental degradation, property damage, and bodily injury) resulting from HS mismanagement and spills.

b. Significant quantities of petroleum products are stored at various locations on board NASCC. A Spill Prevention, Control, and Countermeasures Plan (SPCC), as required by reference (e), have been developed for NASCC to decrease the potential for oil spills. In addition, oil spills create visible and lasting effects on wildlife, beaches, boats, and ships, as well as create a risk of fire or explosion. The discharge of harmful quantities of oil into navigable waters of the United States is prohibited.

c. Reference (a) identifies a Qualified Individual and Facility Incident Commander (FIC). The Qualified Individual is required to implement the plan and obligate resources necessary for response. The Facility Incident Commander directs and coordinates spill response operations.

5. Policy. NASCC supports and shall implement the requirements of references (a) through (h).

a. NASCC shall manage oil and hazardous substances and train personnel to prevent and control accidents, fires, or spills.

b. NASCC spill response personnel shall operate under direction of the National Incident Management System (NIMS), and adhere to the responsibilities of the Facility Incident Commander, Response Management Team, and other Incident Command System team members outlined in reference (h).

c. The response actions and standard operating procedures shall be implemented to safely mitigate spills and prevent or minimize damage to property and nature resources.

d. Response personnel shall become familiar with the content and use of this plan prior to activation during a spill event.

e. NASCC shall adhere to the equipment, logistics, and personnel training requirements of this plan.

6. Action. Action shall be in accordance with the requirements and guidance contained in reference (h). A detailed outline of duties is listed for incident response personnel in reference (h). These duties and responsibilities include:

a. Commanding Officer, NASCC, is designated as the Facility Incident Commander.

b. Fire Department shall:

(1) Provide the Facility Response Team (FRT) to respond, evaluate, control, and contain OHS spills, and to implement the Incident Command System (ICS).

(2) Designate a Qualified Individual during initial response (control and containment).

c. Corpus Christi Oil Spill Response Organization shall:

(1) Provide on-water or land-based spill response beyond the capability of the installation.

d. Environmental Division of NASCC Public Works Department shall:

(1) Direct on-scene operations associated with OHS releases and assume Qualified Individual responsibilities upon relieving the Fire Department.

- (2) Request/provide assistance and resources to the Navy Federal On-Scene Coordinator (FOSC-R).
  - (3) Coordinate all required notifications and document details regarding OHS spill incidents.
  - (4) Coordinate training sessions and direct a public awareness program to inform all personnel regarding spill prevention practices, spill discovery, and notification procedures.
  - (5) Ensure an adequate inventory of spill response material, and that such material is properly staged, inspected, maintained, and replenished after use.
  - (6) Review and update the Facility Response Plan and Discharge Prevention and Response Plan annually and after each incident involving activation of the plan.
  - (7) Ensure proper containerization and disposal of all wastes resulting from spills.
- e. Security Department shall secure the spill area, control traffic, and assist when site evacuation is required.
  - f. Public Affairs Officer shall provide prompt and accurate information to concerned parties.
  - g. Staff Judge Advocate shall monitor the Navy's legal interest in spill incidents and advise the Incident Commander of the legal aspects when spills involve parties other than the Navy.
  - h. Safety Officer shall provide technical assistance and advice with respect to the health and safety of involved personnel.
  - i. NASCC personnel, tenant commands, and contractors shall immediately report releases of oil or hazardous substances.



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
