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James Honea takes the helm as the next MCPON

Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy Russell Smith passed the ceremonial cutlass, via the Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Michael Gilday, to Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy James Honea during a change of office and retirement ceremony September 8.

The ceremony held at the U.S. Naval Academy's Mahan Hall marked the end of more than three decades of Naval service for MCPON Smith.

Smith has served as the 15th MCPON since August 29, 2018. During his term, he instituted Laying the Keel, an updated leadership development career path, revised the command master chief instruction, and the Sailor of the Year program.

More importantly, he tirelessly advocated policy and program improvements for the Navy's Sexual Assault Prevention and Response program as well as increased Sailor access for mental health care to congressional members during his annual

testimonies before the House Armed Services Committee.

Gilday presided over the ceremony and highlighted Smith's accomplishments during his naval career while thanking him for his leadership.

"Your tireless efforts to provide Sailors with mental, morale, and spiritual support has helped make our fleet more resilient and much more effective," said Gilday. "Your leadership ensured that our most important resource, our people, are ready to serve and defend the Nation we love. Having conducted more than 200 fleet visits all over the world, your outreach and willingness to be there for Sailors and their families is what truly made your service so remarkable. Thank you for everything you have done over these past four years. Our

Navy and our Navy family are much stronger than it was four years ago."

After the ceremonial passing of the MCPON cutlass, MCPON Honea took the helm of the enlisted force as the Navy's 16th MCPON. During the ceremony, he spoke about his top priorities; warfighting competency, professional and character development, and quality of life.

"When I was selected for MCPON, I thought heavily on what my tenure means and what I could bring to you all," said Honea. "I'm glad I chose to be challenged by this adventure and I'm proud of what it has brought me. I thank you all for accepting the same challenge and being on this journey with me. I have always been proud to be your Shipmate, and I'm privileged to be your MCPON."

CNO: A Navy ready to fight tonight is the focus

While investments in a future fleet are vital, so is maintaining the readiness of the current fleet so that it's ready to sail into harm's way, should that be necessary, the chief of naval operations said.

The other focus is on the sailor and his or her family's wellbeing, said Adm. Michael Gilday, who spoke virtually today at the State of Defense conference, sponsored by Defense One.

Modernizing the current fleet is important, he said, since 60-to-70% of that fleet will still be in service a decade from now.

"We're not going to have a navy larger than we can sustain," he added.

The U.S. shipbuilding industry, which is made up of five companies, is another vital aspect, Gilday

"We're trying to turn the corner here in terms of giving the shipbuilding industry steady and predictable demand, certainly in terms of ship numbers," he said. "We need to sustain that steady demand signal."

The current proposed shipbuilding budget is \$27 billion, which is the highest ever, he said. The goal is to grow the number of ships to 350.

Ross completes homeport shift to Norfolk

The Arleigh Burke-class guidedmissile destroyer USS Ross (DDG 71) returns to Naval Station Norfolk, marking the end of a nearly 10 year tour of her time as a Forward Deployed Naval Forces-Europe (FDNF-E) Destroyer, Sept. 10, 2022.

Ross turned over her duties in Rota, Spain with USS Paul Ignatius (DDG 117), where Paul Ignatius will patrol the Mediterranean, strengthening our alliances and partnerships while operating alongside NATO Allies and regional partners.

Capt. James Johnston, U.S. 2nd Fleet's maritime operations center director, spoke to the crew of Ross upon their return to Norfolk.

"On behalf of Vice Adm. Dwyer, Commander, U.S. 2nd Fleet, I am honored to be the first one to welcome you home on this beautiful summer day. As an FDNF-E destroyer, your team proudly

represented our Navy and our nation, working side by side with our Allies and partners, building interoperability and providing invaluable defensive capabilities over the course of 12 patrols within 6th Fleet," said Johnston.

Throughout Ross' time in U.S. 6th Fleet, the ship participated in previous iterations of Exercise Sea Breeze, Breeze, African Lion, FOST, BALTOPs, Formidable Shield, and other multilateral maritime training opportunities with partners to include Cyprus, France, Georgia, Greece, Italy, Morocco, Norway, Romania, Ukraine and the United Kingdom. Mission sets during these exercises included surface warfare, anti-submarine warfare, anti-air warfare, and strike warfare scenarios that focus on maintaining maritime stability and security.

USS Harry S. Truman returns home from 9-month deployment

The Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Harry S. Truman (CVN 75), flagship of the Harry S. Truman Carrier Strike Group (HSTCSG), and the embarked commands and staffs of Carrier Air Wing (CVW) 1, Destroyer Squadron (DESRON) 28, and Carrier Strike Group (CSG) 8 returned home to Naval Station Norfolk, Sept. 12, 2022, marking the end of their nine-month deployment after operating in the U.S. 6th Fleet area of operations in response to Russia's unprovoked invasion of Ukraine.

The ship sailed more than 65.000 nautical miles, all while conducting multiple operations in the region to include enhanced air policing missions, dual and tri-carrier operations, and the NATO- led vigilance activities Neptune

Shield 22 and Neptune Strike 22. During its historic deployment, the Truman strengthened relationships with NATO Allies and partners while deterring aggression in the region.

Together with CVW 1, Truman demonstrated the Navy's continuing regional commitment to the U.S. European Command (EUCOM) area of responsibility, the NATO Alliance and our regional partners. Truman hosted more than 400 guests.

"This has been an outstanding deployment by every measure due to the expertise and professionalism of our Sailors," said Capt. Gavin Duff, Truman's commanding officer."

Gacad and Manaog swore the naturalization oath of allegiance with the help of more than 16 U.S. Navy Judge Advocates, Legalmen, and civilian paralegals, spread throughout three countries and at sea, and the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (US-CIS) Washington Field Office.

"I'm proud and honored to be a part of this historic event," said Manaog,

who is assigned to Airborne Command and Control Squadron (VAW) 126. "Our names will be in the history books.' Gacad, who is assigned to Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 211, also expressed his delight in reaching this milestone on

his journey to citizenship. "I'm very happy after this long process," said Gacad. "I can finally say I'm proud to be an American."

Gacad started the process of becoming a citizen in March 2021. However, he had to postpone his naturalization due to the scheduled deployment.

Modernization of Armed Forces a collaborative effort

The Defense Department, in collaboration with academia, industry, allies and partners, is developing cutting-edge technology to ensure the warfighter has the upper edge on the battlefield.

Heidi Shyu, undersecretary of defense for research and engineering. provided virtual opening remarks at the Inaugural Defense Department Basic Research Conference in Arlington, Virginia.

The fiscal year 2022 National Defense Strategy sets out three main themes, she said.

The first theme is integrated deterrence. Research and engineering, or R&E, is working to ensure that the joint force can operate seamlessly across all domains — air, land, sea, cyber and space — and in concert with allies and partners, she said.

R&E is advancing several international partnerships, including with Australia, the United Kingdom, Israel and NATO, she said.

"Our foreign comparative test program also promotes coalition interoperability and strengthens our shared defense industrial base. Our mission engineering division is using modeling and simulation to assess joint capability gaps, and how we're integrating critical enabling technologies into mission architectures," Shyu

The second theme is campaigning. This relies upon R&E's efforts to work with partners across the interagency, including the Departments of Treasury and Commerce, the State Department and the Small Business Administration, she said.

The Rapid Defense Experimentation Reserve program has embarked on a continuous campaign of joint experimentation to close the gaps in joint warfighting capability, she said. These joint experiments are scenario-based and will be conducted in sixmonth cycles starting next year.

This experimentation, she said, will involve 14 critical technology

areas for the warfighter. The technology areas include biotechnology; quantum sciences; advanced materials; future G, which is beyond 5G technologies that also have a lot of commercial development, trusted artificial intelligence and autonomy; microelectronics; space technology; renewable energy; integrated network; systems of systems; advanced computing and software; human-machine interfaces; hypersonics; direct energy; and integrated sensing and cyber.

The third theme is building enduring advantages, Shyu said. R&E is working to identify reforms to accelerate the development and acquisition of critical technologies and is making necessary investments to the workforce.

"We're supporting the future defense innovation base through initiatives to support small businesses, startups and other nontraditional companies and encouraging them to work with the DOD," she said.

Ukraine's success was a surprise only to the Russians

Ukraine's success in its counteroffensive against the Russian invasion did not surprise its allies and partners, Pentagon Press Secretary Air Force Brig. Gen. Pat Ryder said.

"I think if anyone was surprised, just based on the reports that we've seen in terms of the Russian military's response, it was probably the Russians," he said.

Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy told reporters that Ukrainian service members had liberated more than 2,300 square miles of the country from the Russians. The president said Ukrainian troops are pressing Russian forces northeast of Kharkiv and many of the invaders have fled across the border into Russia.

"Certainly, since the beginning of Russia's invasion into Ukraine, we've seen the Ukrainians demonstrate a remarkable adaptability and their ability to use their warfighting capabilities to great effect,' Ryder said during a Pentagon news conference. "So, it's not surprising to us that they have pushed as quickly as they have."

The Ukrainian military also took advantage of military opportunities that presented themselves on the battlefield. The Kharkiv counteroffensive is proof of that, the general said.

Western weapons and supplies played a part in the success of the counteroffensive and at a meeting of the Ukraine Defense Contact Group in Ramstein Air Base, Germany, Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III and counterparts from nearly 50 other nations pledged to keep the supply chain moving and increase aid that can be applied to mid-term and long-term Ukrainian defenses, Ryder said.

Russians unprovoked invasion of Ukraine is a challenge to the international rules-based order that has prevented wars among major powers since the end of World War II.

Countering Russia requires a mix of aid that will make a difference today, and aid that presents Ukraine the capabilities it will need to fight and/ or deter Russia in the future, defense officials have

"Secretary Austin and other U.S. government leaders continue to regularly engage with our Ukrainian counterparts," Ryder said during the press conference. "I think last week's meeting at Ramstein is a good example of how seriously we're taking this and that we are constantly engaged in a dialogue to determine what are the needs of our Ukrainian partners, based on the conditions on the ground."

TEEN: "Nghoo." MOM: "I'm sorry, Sweetie, but I don't understand. One more time.'

TEEN: "Ngood." [Teen slams bedroom door, leaving Mom dumbfounded in hall.] END SCENE.

If this after school vignette sounds familiar to you, then you have teenagers. Our own son, Hayden, reenacted this scene day after day, week after week, month after month, for about four years until he left for college.

Hayden's father and I used to rock his world. He'd burst out of elementary school each day and find me waiting

there to walk him home. His eyes would light up, and he'd plow into me with open arms. He'd linger a few seconds so I could run my hand through his sandy hair and kiss him on the head.

But soon, Hayden grew into a teenger, and all affection, conversation and attention became forced. No more openarmed greetings or shampoo-scented smooches. A reluctant side-hug was as good as it was gonna get.

When Hayden first started withdrawing from us, I panicked and thought, "Why did I let him watch that PG-13 movie when he was twelve?! He's always resented me for those bowl hair cuts I used to give him. I should have never yelled at him when he put that waffle in the VCR! Oh God, what have I done!?!"

We worried and watched, waiting for a call from the police informing us that Hayden was holding the school principal hostage or that he was hitchhiking across the country on a crime spree.

The police never called, but we feared that Hayden's withdrawal from us was clear evidence that he was on the brink of a teenage breakdown, all caused by our overbearing demands and inadequate parenting.

Eventually, we did receive reports of Hayden's behavior, but not from law

enforcement or school authorities. Other parents told us what Hayden had done.

"My daughter told us the funniest story about Hayden at supper last night - apparently he had the whole literature class laughing yesterday at school."

"That skit Hayden did for our Cub Scout den was priceless. We videotaped

"Hayden was so chatty and polite when I gave him a ride after football practice yesterday."

"You must be so proud that the Biology teacher played Hayden's cell project video to all the classes. It was so well done."

Initially, we thought, "Are you sure you have the right kid here? Hayden is the one that wears a hooded sweatshirt, doesn't make eye contact and grunts. What skit? What cell project?'

Slowly, we began dissecting this brooding man-child living in our house. When we stopped blaming ourselves and instead, began discretely examining Hayden's separate parts and distinct personalities, we started to understand the creature our son was becoming.

We discovered that Hayden wasn't an axe murderer, he was just a teenager.

Outside our home, he was a smart, funny, outgoing football player, scout

leader, band geek and math tutor. When he arrived home, Hayden hid his burgeoning identity from us, afraid that we'd interfere or attempt to change him. His "split personality" gave him the freedom to grow, mature, and as much as we hated it, become independent from of us.

Eventually, we gave Hayden space to create himself without interference. In the meantime, we discovered meaning in the grunts and grumbles he emitted.

We learned that "Nghu" really means, "Thanks for asking about my day at school, Mom – it went quite well despite the fact that I missed you terribly and couldn't wait to come home and eat your delicious home cooking."

While side-hugging Hayden, I interpreted the pained expression on his face to mean, "Mother, my gratitude and respect for you are so intense that I can only bear it for a second or two before I must shove you away."

Another thing I learned: Asking one's teen for a kiss on the cheek definitely requires bribery. Chocolate chip cookies always worked for me.
