

Training Squadron Seven Change of Command

The "Eagles" of Training Squadron Seven (VT-7) held change of command ceremony on board Naval Air Station Meridian Friday, Nov. 21 during which CDR Austin Ordway was relieved by CDR Tom Kellner.

CDR Ordway served as the squadron's commanding officer from July 2024 to November 2025. Under his leadership, the Eagles flew 21,178 sorties, totaling over 20,000 flight hours, and winged 101 pilots for the United States Navy, United States Marine Corps, and the French Navy.

"These accomplishments could not have been achieved without the incredible men and women of VT-7, who rose to the challenge, every day, to do their part in training

the best pilots in the world and creating the next generation of Naval Aviators," Ordway said.

Following the ceremony, CDR Ordway retired from the Navy after 20 years of meritorious service.

CDR Kellner is a native of Baton Rouge, Louisiana. A graduate of The Citadel, he was commissioned through the Reserve Officer Training Corps in August 2006 and completed Naval flight training in April 2009.

Kellner flew F/A-18
Hornets and Super Hornets
out of NAS Lemoore,
California, from July 2010
to March 2020 with the
VFA-146 "Blue Diamonds,"
VFA-122 "Flying Eagles,"
VFA-2 "Bounty Hunters,"
and VFA-86 "Sidewinders."

He deployed across the globe aboard USS Ronald Reagan (CVN 76), USS Carl Vinson (CVN 70), and USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) and supported Operations NEW DAWN, ENDURING FREEDOM, and FREEDOM'S SENTINEL in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Leaving California in early 2020, CDR Kellner participated in a cross-service tour with the 83rd Fighter Weapons Squadron at Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida, and ran the Naval Weapons System Evaluation Program, conducting live-fire missile shoots with numerous U.S. Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force fighter squadrons as they prepared to deploy.

Following selection for command, he moved to NAS Meridian and reported to Training Wing One in the summer of 2023 to begin training in the T-45C Goshawk as an instructor pilot. He became the Executive Officer of VT-7 in July 2024.

CDR Kellner has accumulated over 3,100 flight-hours, 18 combat missions, and 571 arrested landings on ten different aircraft carriers. His awards include the Meritorious Service Medal, Air Force Aerial Achievement Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal and various service and unit awards. Additionally, he earned a Master of Science in Human Systems Integration from the Naval Postgraduate School.

VT-7 flies the T-45C Goshawk and trains students in the fundamentals of Naval strike aviation, preparing them to earn their "Wings of Gold."

The Eagles conducted local flight operations in Meridian, as well as four carrier qualification detachments, five weapons detachments, and two additional training detachments in locations such as El Centro, California and Jacksonville and Key West, Florida.



Amid China's warship expansion, Navy's top military officer touts sailor-first focus

HONOLULU (HawaiiNewsNow) - The U.S. Navy's top military officer is in Honolulu, wrapping up a 10-day tour of the Asia-Pacific.

Daryl Caudle, chief of Adm. naval operations, visited U.S. bases in Japan, South Korea, Guam, and Hawaii, meeting with sailors and allies.

He also toured South Korean and Japanese shipbuilding facilities, part of a strategy to expand the U.S. Navy's industrial capacity as Beijing rolls out more advanced warships, including a new aircraft carrier.

Caudle toured the barracks at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam Friday morning and $talked\,with\,sailors\,about\,their\,living\,conditions.$

Faced with ongoing threats from China, North Korea and Russia in the region, Caudle believes a "sailor-first" approach is critical to ensuring resilient and combat-ready forces.

"The quality of service, quality of life, quality of work, the way we actually build them, so they're masters of their craft, is so important to the concepts of operations, so that we are the most lethal Navy every single day, until we get where our capacity is back to where it should be," he said. This as the Navy struggles to modernize an aging fleet and infrastructure, and America's ability to build and maintain ships falls far short of the competition.

"The trajectory of those threats and their emergent technologies and capabilities continue to grow at staggering paces. So we have to sustain our ability to keep up with that," Caudle said.

"We're behind in shipbuilding, where that's atrophied over decades in the United States, and it's such an important part of our global presence here, our logistics here, our ability to defend ourselves and and have the deterrence mechanism necessary."

"We just can't overmatch with just size and capacity anymore. So our schemes of maneuver, how we counter target, how we do our targeting, how we do long range precision, lethal effects," Caudle added.

Changes are underway, but will take years. In the meantime, the Navy is working with shipbuilders in South Korea and potentially Japan to reduce bottlenecks and fill in some of the gaps.

New bill seeks to exempt military pay from federal income tax

Two lawmakers want to fully exempt federal compensation from income tax — a move that would deliver a significant pay boost for service members and mark one of the most sweeping tax changes for the military community.

The legislation, dubbed the Service MembersTax Relief Act. seeks to eliminate federal income tax on all active-duty and reserve pay, including enlistment, retention and education bonuses and all special and incentive pays.

The measure would go well beyond previous tax-exemption proposals, which largely focus on bonuses or specialty pays.

In May, for example, a bipartisan group of lawmakers introduced the BONUS act, which would amend a section of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 to explicitly exempt all military bonuses from federal income tax. "The bill builds on existing tax exclusions for certain military benefits and responds to longstanding concerns raised by troops, families and advocates who believe those who serve should not be taxed on the bonuses they earn in service

to our country," Rep. Jen Kiggans (R-Va.), the sponsor of the BONUS act, said at the time. Similarly, the No Tax on Bonuses Act, introduced in April, seeks to exclude enlistment service members' reenlistment bonuses from gross income.

Currently, service members deployed to combat zones receive tax-free income. In addition, most allowances that make up a significant portion of a service member's total compensation, including basic allowance for housing and basic allowance for subsistence are tax-exempt. Veterans' disability compensation is also exempt from federal income taxes. Together, these exemptions amount to roughly \$30 billion a year in foregone federal income tax revenue each year.

Sen. Pete Ricketts (R-Neb.) and Rep. Abe Hamadeh (R-Ariz.), who introduced the Service Members Tax Relief act this week, are also sponsoring the Tax Cuts for Veterans Act of 2025, a measure that would amend Section 122 of the Internal Revenue Code to exclude all military retirement pay and veterans' benefits from federal income taxes. This includes all retired and retainer pay under Titles 10

and 14, as well as all VA monthly benefits, including disability compensation and survivor payments covered under Titles 37 and 38.

The two measures stand apart from prior proposals, as no recent bill has attempted a tax exemption of this scope.

"It is pretty sweeping... and it's potentially a very expensive proposal. Now, there's a reason why Congress has, on a bipartisan basis, provided these existing tax exclusions for military and veterans benefits — there's a wide bipartisan appreciation for the fact that if you served our country, put your life and put your body on the line — you're receiving benefits that you deserve for that service...I think any proposal that costs tens of billions of dollars per year, Congress is going to scrutinize," Andrew Lautz, director of tax policy at the Bipartisan Policy Center, told Federal News Network.

It is unclear what strategy the sponsors plan to pursue — standalone bills often face political hurdles, and lawmakers frequently try to attach such proposals to larger legislative packages like the annual National Defense Authorization Act to increase their chances.

"These bills are fiscally conservative in

that they offer relief through the tax code instead of new spending. It is a win-win; the exemption instantly improves takehome pay, while helping with recruitment and retention, which in turn keeps our war fighters strong," Hamadeh said.

Lautz pushed back on the idea that the bills are "fiscally conservative," arguing that a dollar of a tax cut that isn't offset adds to the deficit just as much as a dollar of new spending that isn't paid for.

"If you've got \$100 billion spending program or the \$100 billion tax cut, and you're not paying for that — that is not fiscally responsible. Now, Republican lawmakers have shown a preference for cutting taxes over increasing government spending, and Democrats vice versa, that is an unmistakable trend. But in terms of the fiscally responsible approach here, I think the message we've sent to both parties is that if you're going to have a large tax cut or you're going to have a large spending increase, you should pay for it with offsetting either spending cuts or tax increases," Lautz said.

After 84 years, USS Arizona's unknowns may soon be identified

Since Japanese aircraft sank the USS Arizona during the Dec. 7, 1941, surprise attack on Pearl Harbor, the battleship has remained in place under water, the watery gravesite to more than 900 sailors entombed

The U.S. Navy, as with other sunken ships in the harbor, considers those entombed beneath the ship's hull to be in their final resting place.

The battleship suffered more loss of life than any American ship during the attack, its 1,177 dead comprising nearly half the 2,403 killed at Pearl Harbor.

Of the ship's dead, 277 of its sailors and Marines are buried in Honolulu's National Memorial of the Pacific. The identity of 86 of those men remain unknown to this day.

However, this past week the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency announced that it "will seek exhumation of dozens of unknowns from the Pearl Harbor attack once an advocacy group is confirmed to have reached the required mark in its genealogy work," Stars & Stripes first reported.

The issue was first raised in February

2021 when Kelly McKeague, the director of the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, was asked during a Facebook Live meeting when the agency would disinter them.

McKeague stated at the time that it didn't make "pragmatic sense" to identify them.

Rear Adm. Darius Banaji, the agency's deputy director, also reported that the Navy has no plans to disinter the remains and try to identify them because there is insufficient documentation.

Unlike the USS Oklahoma, where 388 previously unidentified sailors and Marines were disinterred from that same cemetery and identified in 2015, Banaji told The Associated Press in 2021 that the military has files on just half of those missing from the Arizona.

That number was once again halved when it came to medical records. The Navy has the dental records for only 130 men who were aboard the Arizona. Some documents are believed to have been destroyed with the battleship. Others may have been lost in a 1973 fire at a military personnel records office, according to the AP.


