# Navy sending Sailors and ships to help build Gaza aid pier

Navy cargo ships Roy P. Benavidez, 2nd Lt. John P. Bobo, and 1st Lt. Baldomero Lopez are poised to head to the eastern Mediterranean Sea with more than 250 sailors to help build a humanitarian aid pier off the Gaza Strip, Navy officials confirmed Wednesday.

Sailors will join at least five Army vessels taking part in the plan that the Pentagon says will use the Joint Logistics Over-The-Shore, or JLOTS, capability to construct a floating dock-like staging point, as well as a pier extending to land, for the delivery of humanitarian aid to Palestinians, according to Navy officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity. Roughly 260 sailors from Naval Beach Group 1 will set up a 72-footwide by 270-foot-long floating dock three miles off Gaza.

They will also operate the causeway ferries connected to the pier, and will offload cargo into trucks that will deliver aid to Gaza, Navy officials said.

The Benavidez will carry Army equipment to the region, while the Bobo and the Lopez will transport Navy assets.

A logistics pad will exist on the beach, but Navy officials reiterated that no U.S. personnel will operate on the ground in Gaza, and that the Bobo and the Lopez will remain on station with sailors for the duration of the mission.

## Costs, wait times up for military families after pharmacy cyberattack

Military pharmacies are affected by the Change Healthcare outage prompted by a cyberattack, but they're still able to fill prescriptions.

Some military families may have been forced to pay the full cost of their prescriptions up front — a financial burden that can total thousands of dollars at some of Tricare's in-network retail pharmacies in the wake of a cyberattack on Change Healthcare, the nation's largest commercial prescription processor.

Meanwhile, military pharmacies are still struggling to return to normal operations



nearly a month after the Feb. 21 hack began disrupting regular operations at thousands of pharmacies around the world. Change Healthcare disconnected its systems from other parts of the medical ecosystem in an attempt to limit the attack's impact.

Most retail pharmacies have restarted filling and refilling patients' prescriptions after much of Change Healthcare's network regained function March 8, according to officials from Optum, the UnitedHealth Group subsidiary that oversees Change Healthcare. That includes successfully verifying that a customer's insurance will help cover the cost of each medication. Not so for military pharma-

cies.

"Change Healthcare is still working with Defense Health Agency officials to reestablish the connection with military pharmacies," a company spokesperson told Military Times on Wednesday. Defense Health Agency spokesman Peter Graves confirmed that on-base pharmacies have not returned to normal and are still manually processing prescriptions.

For now, that means customers will continue to see longer wait times at military pharmacies.

"Military pharmacies will give priority to urgent prescriptions, followed by routine prescriptions," Graves said in an email to Military Times. "Each military hospital and clinic will continue to offer pharmacy operations based on their local manning and resources. Please be patient while pharmacies take longer than usual to safely fill prescription needs."

Of the 260 sailors partaking in the mission, the majority are boatswain's mates who will build the discharge facility, Navy officials said.

Some Seabees will also participate in the mission as equipment operators, and a handful of corpsmen and quartermasters will also be on station.

Navy officials said the ships have not yet departed for the mission, and they did not provide a timeline for when they expect their role in the mission to conclude.

Navy officials also noted that the JLOTS mission is Army-led, and the Navy is there to help erect the pier under Army command. The Army's 7th Transportation Brigade from Joint Base Langley-Eustis, Virginia is spearheading the initiative.

Army logistical support vessels Monterrey, Amoros, Wilson Wharf, James A. Loux, and Gen. Frank A. Besson, Jr. departed earlier this month to support building the pier.

'Our capabilities mesh well, and we have already coordinated at the tactical level how we will implement the movement of cargo," a Navy official said. "This is a routine mission for us, and we're just falling in together in step to conduct this mission.

The Army and the Navy will utilize the same structure they did during exercises like Exercise Talisman Sabre last year – a joint exercise between the U.S. and Australia where the 7th Transportation Brigade and Naval Beach Group 1 teamed up to establish a discharge facility and causeway.

According to Air Force Maj. Gen. Pat Ryder, the pier is part of a larger,

"We are thrilled to bring the Navy to Montgomery," said NAVCO's director, CDR Anthony Falvo. tional effort to provide aid to Gaza and that the pier will be operational in less than two months.

We expect the pier to be fully operational in approximately 60 days, which will be able to facilitate the delivery of up to 2 million meals daily," Ryder told reporters earlier this month.

It remains unclear how the U.S. military will protect American service members, the offshore staging area and the causeway itself from attacks by the Palestinian militant group Hamas, though Ryder said earlier this month that Israel is part of the planning process and could provide security through its own forces.

"If Hamas truly does care about the Palestinian people, then again, one would hope that this international mission to deliver aid to people who need it would be able to happen and unhindered," Ryder said.

# Senators eye pay boost for junior troops, more funds for housing fixes

A key Senate leader is pushing to pass targeted pay raises for junior enlisted troops this year but warned that budget caps on military appropriations for next fiscal year may complicate the plans.

Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman Jack Reed, D-R.I., said he also hopes to find ways to fund wideranging barracks improvement projects and other quality of life changes in coming months.

"I hope we can do it, because it provides real incentives and it will help respond to the issue of retention and recruitment that we have seen," Reed said. "It reflects the respect and regard we have for our forces. We can praise them, as we do, but it helps to pay them well too."

The comments from Reed during a meeting with reporters on Monday echo goals already outlined by House leadership to find ways to improve quality of life for younger service members and their families. But whether the two chambers can adopt such a plan will depend on spending debates in coming months.

Last week, the White House unveiled plans for a 4.5% pay raise for all troops next January as part of its fiscal 2025 Defense Department budget request. That target would be slightly below the 5.2% raise service members saw this past January but would still mark the third consecutive year of raises above 4% for military personnel.

# CNO travels to Arctic for Operation Ice Camp

Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Lisa Franchetti traveled to the Arctic Ocean to attend Operation Ice Camp (ICE CAMP) 2024 and to visit with crewmembers of a U.S. Navy fast attack submarine, March 17.

Previously known as Ice Exercise (ICEX), the operation's new title better reflects the Department of the Navy's Arctic strategy and its priority to maintain enhanced regional presence.

"Our ability to operate on, under and above Arctic waters ensures this region remains one of low tensions, and prevents competitors from disrupting emerging sea lines of communication and commerce," said Franchetti. "The Navy will continue to modernize our facilities and platforms, and train personnel to meet the demands of an increasingly accessible Arctic operating environment.'

ICE CAMP is a three-week operation, hosted by Commander, U.S. Submarine Forces, in collaboration with the Arctic Submarine Laboratory (ASL), and is designed to research, test, and evaluate operational capabilities in the Arctic region. While visiting, the CNO had the opportunity to speak with Sailors operating in the austere Arctic conditions.

# What troops and families need to know about filing taxes in 2024

It's that time of year again — tax season. And April 15 is just around the corner.

Military Times spoke with Susan Mitchell, the Defense Department's tax counsel and executive director of the Armed Forces Tax Council, about tips and areas of particular interest to troops and families.

Fortunately, if you're in the military, there's no need to pay a tax preparer or for military-specific tax help. Free tax software is offered through Military OneSource's MilTax resources, which are attuned to unique military benefits and needs. You can file federal and up to three state tax returns through this software.

In addition, service members and family members have access to military tax consultants with special training in military-specific situations through Military OneSource.

"I always like to advise service members the fastest and most reliable way to file their taxes is electronically, and to choose direct deposit if they're expecting a refund," Mitchell said.

There are 14 installations in the United States running Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) tax centers where you can go to get tax-preparation help in person, according to the Military OneSource locator. These locations — with Internal Revenue Service-certified volunteers who are also trained in military-specific tax regulations — are open to service members of all branches and, in some cases, to retirees. It's best to call ahead; some require appointments. A limited number of these centers operate overseas, including three in Japan and one in England.

#### The Basics:

All Defense Department tax statements, including W-2 statements, are available through the military's myPay site, <u>https://mypay.dfas.mil/</u>.

There are longstanding tax filing extensions available for certain service members. While the federal tax filing deadline is April 15 this year, troops stationed outside the United States and Puerto Rico can qualify for an automatic two-month extension until June 15, both for filing and for paying taxes that are due. That extension is designed to help troops who may have trouble getting all the documents they need.

Those overseas who are unable to file by June 15 can request an additional extension to Oct. 15. But remember that any taxes due must be paid by April 15 (or by the June 15 deadline if overseas). If not, you could be subject to both interest charges and a failure-to-pay penalty, Mitchell said.

Tax filing deadlines for service members deployed to combat zones are extended for the period of their service in the combat zone, plus 180 days after their last day in the combat zone.

This year, service members in designated disaster areas should check to see whether filing extensions apply to them, Mitchell said. For example, deadlines are extended for taxpayers affected by severe storms and flooding in San Diego; wildfires in the Spokane, Washington area; and those affected by storms in parts of Michigan, West Virginia, Maine, Rhode Island and Connecticut. Check the IRS page on disaster relief situations for more information.

Tax brackets: There are still seven tax rates for 2023, but the income levels have shifted slightly to account for inflation, Mitchell said. There was roughly a 7% increase in the amount of taxable income in each tier, she said, "so hopefully service members won't find themselves paying more taxes than they have previously, with some of these changes due to inflation."

For example, single service members with taxable income ranging from \$44,726 to \$95,375 would be in the 22% tax bracket. Married couples filing jointly with taxable income from \$89,451 to \$190,750 would be in the 22% tax bracket. For more information visit the IRS tax rates page.

# Navy Arctic Service Medal announced

The Navy is rolling out a Navy Arctic Service Medal this year, serving as an extension of the existing Navy Arctic Service Ribbon.

The creation of the medal comes as the Navy has ramped up operations and exercises in the Arctic in recent years, and as Navy leaders have called for a strong military presence in the region as global warming opens more waters to navigation in the frigid territory.

Those eligible for the medal are enlisted sailors and officers in the Navy and Marine Corps who were assigned to a unit that conducted an ice-covered strait transit, such as the Bering Strait or Barrow Strait, or a unit that conducted a transit of the North Pole, the Navy said in a statement Monday.

Those assigned to a submarine that "conducted a vertical surfacing through ice, including through an arctic polynya, or ice picked against the ice canopy," or a submarine that "conducted at least seven days of classified military operations while under the marginal ice zone or pack ice," are also eligible, the Navy said.

Likewise, those whose commanding officers determine they were assigned to an ice camp or an operations center set up on an ice floe are also eligible for the medal.

Civilians serving in these units also qualify to receive the medal.

The Navy said to expect distribution no sooner than later this year. The chief of naval operations and the commandant of the Marine Corps will proceed with setting up an administrative process to retroactively grant the Navy Arctic Service Medal.

The Navy first created the Navy Arctic Service Ribbon in 1987 for those who completed 28 days of service in the Arctic Circle after January 1, 1982.

The service released its "Blue Arctic" strategy for the region in 2021, urging the sea service to "operate more assertively" there.

It also cautioned that Russia is reopening old bases in the Arctic and "reinvigorating" regional exercises, which it expects to continue, and warns that China will also bolster its naval activity ...

"Drives me crazy," I said, "especially when we're watching TV. He says stuff like, 'See Hon, that guy's an undercover detective,' and I'm like, 'Really? Do you think I'm a complete idiot?""

"Yes!" Lilly pointed a finger at me in agreement. "And when he comes home from the grocery, he takes food out of the bag, and tells me what it is, like, 'See Lil, this is a cucumber," she said while more offensive? Does he think that women are less intelligent than men?

The first known use of the term "mansplain" was in 2008 comments on a blog post, although the practice has arguably been around for centuries. In 2018, the term was added to the Oxford English Dictionary, and defined as "Of a man: to explain (something) needlessly, overbearingly, or condescendingly, esp. (typically when addressing a woman) in a manner thought to reveal a patron. izing or chauvinistic attitude." In a 2022 study on mansplaining, one scientist proposed a broader definition: "[P] roviding an unsolicited or unwelcome, condescending or persistent, explanation to someone, either questioning their knowledge or assuming they did not know, regardless of the veracity of the explanation. The mansplainer is most typically a man and the recipient is most typically not a man."

Today mansplaining is recognized as a common phenomena, yet there is still disagreement over why men do it.
