USS Harry S. Truman Conducts Emergent Repair Availability

The Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Harry S. Truman (CVN 75) arrived at U.S. Naval Support Activity (NSA) Souda Bay, Greece, on Feb. 16 to conduct an Emergent Repair Availability (ERAV) on the ship's starboard quarter following a recent collision. Damage assessed includes the exterior wall of two storage rooms and a maintenance space. External to the ship, damage assessed includes a line handling space, the fantail, and the platform above one of the storage spaces. Aircraft elevator number three sustained no damage and is fully operational. Forward Deployed Regional Maintenance Center (FDRMC) will lead the pier side ERAV, including an assessment and follow-

on repairs to damages sustained. "While the ship is fully mission capable and the ship conducted flight operations following the collision, pulling into port for emergent repairs will enable the ship to continue deployment as scheduled," said Capt. Dave Snowden, Harry S. Truman's commanding officer. An assessment team will conduct a full survey of damaged areas and develop a repair plan to be executed immediately following completion of the assessment. The assessment team includes structural engineers, naval architects, and other personnel from FDRMC and Norfolk Naval Shipyard (NNSY). They will be supported by ship's force personnel and local industry partners for the repair effort.

“The Forward Deployed Regional Maintenance Center’s ability to mobilize resources within and outside the theater to conduct repairs underscores the warfighting capability of the world’s most powerful Navy,” said Vice Adm. J. T. Anderson, commander U.S. Sixth Fleet.

Deployed U.S. Navy ships routinely undergo planned and emergent maintenance periods such as mid-deployment voyage repairs and ERAVs, allowing forward-deployed ships to sustain maximal operational readiness. The United States’ relationships with Allies and partners provides access to ports around the world, granting the U.S. Navy strategic pier availability and resources critical for operational flexibility.

“The Harry S. Truman Carrier Strike Group (HSTCSG) units remain operational across geographic regions in support of their component commanders,”

said Rear Adm. Sean Bailey, commander of HSTCSG. “Our mission has not changed and we remain committed to responding to any challenge in this dynamic and global security environment.”

The carrier strike group includes the flagship USS Harry S. Truman (CVN 75); Carrier Air Wing (CVW) 1, with eight embarked aviation squadrons; staffs from CSG-8, CVW-1, and Destroyer Squadron (DESRON) 28; the Ticonderoga-class guided-missile cruiser USS Gettysburg (CG 64); and three Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyers, USS Stout (DDG 55), USS The Sullivans (DDG 68), and USS Jason Dunham (DDG 109).

HSTCSG’s mission is to conduct prompt and sustained combat operations at sea and maintain a forward presence through sea control and power projection capabilities.

Former Army Reservist Becomes USMC Officer, Now Competes in Strong Man Competitions

She was competitive growing up, her mother, Diane, explained, which was always a part of her character and aided her through her journey of strength training. Although, Sapitro explained her fitness journey really began when she enlisted in the Army Reserves, which gave her a foundation in running.

Sapitro said she enjoyed the military

lifestyle, but she wanted to do more than what the reserves offered her, so she looked to become active duty. The Army, however, didn’t have career options that spoke to her. Instead, she found a calling to the Marine Corps, where she enlisted as an aviation maintenance technician.

During her time as an enlisted Marine, she was surrounded by Marines who participated in obstacle courses and weight training, and so she naturally began doing the same.

Captain's Virtual Suggestion Box: Q & A



● Suggestions

Q. We received several questions regarding galley food options.

A. We strive to provide our galley patrons a well-balanced meal catering to all. Our menus and portion sizes are mandated by the NAVSUP 5-WEEK CYCLE MENU, which is approved by the region's dietitian. We also have the soup, salad, bread, beverage, hot, and dessert bars available throughout

the meals. If you have any additional suggestions, we also hold a quarterly menu review board meeting, which is open to all. The galley managers are available during operating hours to assist with any questions you may have. Additionally, you can share your feedback and suggestions by scanning the QR Code.



Q. When two forms of ID or proof of insurance are required at the main gate, it

would be beneficial to have a digital sign announcing this requirement to the line, to allow drivers to already have their needed documents in hand. This would help with congestion/backup, especially in the morning rush hour.

A. Team Security is working towards adding signage to our installation gates to assist with common practices that may occur. Please be patient as this will take time to order and arrive. In the meantime, PAO pushes out major changes to operations via email and on social media that affect gate operations, i.e. two forms of ID, suspension of trusted traveler, gate closures, etc.). AtHoc messages are also used to communicate essential information.

Q. Good morning!! It's 62 in our building, can PW turn on the heat so we can manage the building ourselves.

A. Virtually all facilities onboard NAS Meridian operate on heat pump systems and do not require PW action to switch the building system to heating. Bldgs 224 and 266 are the only exceptions. Otherwise, tenants should be able to activate heat mode via their local thermostats. If your building's heat is not functioning as intended, please contact your Building Manager, or, if the situation is emergent, the NAVFAC hotline.

Q. Sir, the addition of public access vending machines either outside the NEX and/or Commissary would benefit our civilians,

Sailors, and dependents who just need something to eat or drink quickly at a non-typical hour of the day without having to have interactions with students at the NTTC school house.

A. NAS Meridian has 44 vending machines located across the installation: Drink Machines:- Security, - Bldgs. 208, 255, 330 (3), 361 (2), 353, 367, 369, 229, - Hangar 2 (2); Snack Machines: - Security, - Pass & Tag, - Bowling Alley, - Bldgs. 208, 255, 330 (3), 361 (5), 353, 367, 369 (Gym), 229, 362, 51, 99, - Corrosion Bldg., Air Ops, Simulator, Hangar 2 (2); Frozen Food Machines: - Bldgs. 330, 361. *Additionally, we are pursuing another Micro-Mart to reside in the Hangar.

Federal Military Spouse Workers Exempt from Return-to-Office Rule

Federally employed military spouses who work remotely are now “categorically exempt” from the return-to-office directive issued by President Donald Trump, according to new guidance clarifying the policy. Federal agencies “shall” allow military spouses to continue working remotely, and agencies may continue appointing spouses to remote work positions, according to a memo issued

Wednesday by Charles Ezell, acting director of the Office of Personnel Management, or OPM. The new guidance clarifies a Jan. 27 memo from OPM and the Office of Management and Budget that included a footnote stating agencies “should also exclude military spouses working remotely based on the Military Spouse Employment Act” from the return-to-office requirement. The Jan. 27 memo directed agencies to prepare plans to return all eligible employees to in-person

work, with exceptions for those excused for compelling reasons certified by the agency head and employee supervisor. It further noted military spouses working remotely had a compelling reason not to return to in-person work and agencies “should” exempt them from the requirement. In the wake of the Jan. 27 memo, some military spouses with federal jobs experienced uncertainty and angst about the new policy requiring in-person work. Advocates were concerned the guidance

didn’t explicitly require federal agencies to exempt military spouses from the return-to-office requirement, potentially leading to inconsistent policies across agencies. Being able to work remotely, whether in the continental U.S. or overseas, allows military spouses to continue their careers despite frequent moves to new duty stations with their service members. Working remotely opens up more opportunities for military spouses who can be appointed to re-

mote work positions. Military spouses have long battled problems with unemployment, largely associated with these frequent moves. The military spouse unemployment rate has remained stubbornly above 20%, according to Defense Department surveys. The new guidance applies to spouses of active-duty members, spouses of deceased service members who died while on active duty and haven’t remarried and spouses of disabled service members who retired or oth-

erwise left the service with a 100% disability rating. It also applies to spouses of U.S. Foreign Service members on overseas assignments. The guidance also clarifies that agencies must allow military spouses to continue working remotely regardless of whether they were appointed under the Military Spouse Employment Act and covers those appointed under other appropriate hiring authorities. That applies to future appointments of military spouses to remote work positions.

Avoid These Common Tax Mistakes

Let’s face it: Filing taxes can be stressful! We all have to do it but no doubt, questions sometimes abound: Am I doing this the right way? Am I using the right form? Am I forgetting something? The IRS acknowledges that while tax laws can be complicated, the most common tax return oversights and errors are surprisingly simple. Mistakes such as entering a Social Security number incorrectly or not signing your form can cause delays in getting your refund if you are due one. Other errors, such as failing to claim all the credits and deductions you’re eligible for, can cause you to leave money on the table, or worse, pay money you don’t really owe! To avoid these and other “taxing” situations, beware of these eight common tax mistakes and learn how to avoid — and fix — them

now and in the future.

1. Not Claiming All of Your Credits and Deductions
Depending on your adjusted gross income, or AGI, or modified adjusted gross income, or MAGI, you may be able to take advantage of the following popular credits:

- Child tax credit
- Education credits, including the American opportunity tax credit and lifetime learning credit
- Earned income tax credit
- Retirement savings contributions credit

Make sure you’re properly claiming all of your dependents. For tax purposes, a dependent is defined as a person, other than the taxpayer or the taxpayer’s spouse, whom you can claim on your return if you paid more than 50% of their household expenses for more than six

months in the past year.

Don’t forget about charitable contributions when itemizing your deductions. The IRS has very specific rules about what and how much you can deduct for charitable contributions, so do your research beforehand.

Deductions also may include money you lose on investments. You may be able to deduct up to \$3,000 in capital losses from your ordinary income each year. If you are married filing separately, the cap is \$1,500. Losses above these thresholds can be carried over to the following tax year.

2. Not Being Aware of Tax Considerations for the Military
Because of your military status, you may be eligible for certain tax considerations, such as an exemption of all or a portion of your earnings from federal income taxes while you are deployed to a designated combat zone
