NAS Meridian Celebrates Navy 250 Birthday





Unaccompanied Housing **Maintenance Update:**

A concern was raised regarding ant infestations and slippery walkways caused by A/C condensation and moss buildup around Bldg. 208.

In coordination with residents, the Base Beautification Team promptly cleaned the affected areas, and pest control was treated the same day. Public Works continues to monitor for any recurring issues, and residents are encouraged to report additional concerns by scanning the trouble ticket QR code located inside each UH room or by notifying the Building Manager directly. Teamwork between residents and the Base Beautification Team remains vital to keeping our living spaces safe, clean, and well-maintained.

Traffic Safety Near **Schoolhouses:**

A request was made to install a larger "Cross Traffic Does Not Stop" sign at the twoway stop near the schoolhouses to improve driver awareness.

This action has been completed — the new signage is now in place to help reduce confus

and enhance safety at the intersection.

Traffic Safety Near Main Gate:

NAS Meridian personnel raised concerns about morning congestion and unsafe driving near the front gate, including illegal passing, speeding, U-turns, and vehicles cutting in line outside the blue line — some drivers have been observed turning right off John C. Stennis Drive onto Rabbit Road in front of the Visitor Control Center and immediately making U-turns to bypass traffic. This behavior poses a significant safety hazard.

Lauderdale county has also installed rumble strips and will be installing flashing "stop ahead" alert signs in the future. Commander, Logistics Group Western Pacific WESTERN PACIFIC OCEAN Multinational service members deployed in support of Pacific Partnership 2025 celebrated the Navy's 250th Birthday embarked on the Lewis B. Puller-class expeditionary sea base USS John L. Canley (ESB-6) underway in the Western Pacific Ocean, Oct. 13, 2025.

Pacific Partnership 2025 is a sixmonth operation focused on four lines of effort: engineering, disaster management, medical, and host nation outreach events.

Zumwalt authorized official recognition of Oct. 13 as the Navy's birthday "to enhance a greater appreciation of our Navy heritage and to provide a positive influence toward pride and professionalism in the naval service." In 2025, the Navy celebrates 250 years of building partnerships, strengthening

This is especially true for the Sailors aboard the USS John L. Canley, who are embarked with personnel from five allied nations: Australia, Canada, Germany, New Zealand, and the United Kingdom. Their mission includes Papua New Guinea, Federated States of Micronesia, Palau, Samoa, and Vanuatu. Additional elements conducted fly-in stops in Fiji, the Philippines, and Tonga. Their efforts are building and strengthening multinational ties as partners

"As we celebrate the Navy's 250th birthday, we reflect on two and a half centuries of defending freedom and protecting prosperity around the world," said Capt. Mark Stefanik, mission commander for Pacific Partnership 2025, "I can't think of a better place to celebrate this momentous milestone than at sea, doing what our Navy does best."

Two Thousand Miles of Determination: A Marine's Journey Through Water and Will

Retired Lt. Col. Chuck Collins, a former Marine Corps helicopter pilot, Naval aviator and executive officer of Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) New River, forged a path of resilience at Marine Corps Community Services (MCCS) Aquatics Program on Camp Lejeune. Through the Devil Fish Program, a long-distance swimming initiative that encourages participants to log cumulative swim mileage toward major milestones, he completed a 2,000-mile journey at the MCCS Wallace Creek Fitness Center, Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, Sept. 30, 2025.

For him, the accomplishment is about more than numbers. It represents the values instilled by the U.S. Marine Corps (USMC) and the strength of MCCS Aquatics in fostering fitness for Marines and retirees.

"I was inspired to join the Devil Fish Program by a lifeguard at the MCAS New River indoor pool," Collins said. "She encouraged me to join after I had been swimming for about a year to support the program. I agreed. Little did I know that the benefits to me far

outweighed my support of the program."

That encouragement sparked a journey that has spanned 20 years, with a steady rhythm of two miles a week, eight miles a month and 100 miles a year, completing a remarkable 2,000-mile journey, an achievement that rivals the length of the Rio Grande, which stretches approximately 1,900 miles.


