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Naval Football players becoming Marines

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Defense bill would expand leave for veterans joining federal workforce

Lawmakers are looking to expand access to leave benefits for service members who transition to the federal workforce in the 2024 defense bill.

The latest version of the National Defense Authorization Act, which is expected to pass through the House and Senate this week, includes a provision that would recognize previous military service in calculating family and medical leave for veterans working in the federal government.

"By crediting time in uniform towards paid parental leave for the federal government, we will help retain the best and brightest America has to offer," said Rep. Chrissy Houlahan, D-Pa., in a statement Tuesday. Lawmakers have said family-friendly policies help ensure the public sector has competitive benefits to attract and retain employees amid workforce shortages in cyber and HR.

Other supporters of the policy include Reps. Don Beyer, D-Va., Don Bacon, R-Neb., Nancy Mace, R-S.C., and Chris Smith, R-N.J.

With the defense bill teed up for passage in Congress, President

Joe Biden has signaled he will sign the measure into law later this month. If it clears both steps with the provision, a federal employee with at least a year of active military service will have met requirements for the Family and Medical Leave Act.

The FMLA, which passed in 1993, provides up to 12 weeks of job-protected leave without pay for the birth, adoption or foster of a child, a serious health condition or caregiver leave. Health insurance coverage is also retained during that time. To access that benefit, federal workers have to be in their position for at least a year. Previously, service members were not eligible to credit their prior military time for FMLA if they had transitioned to the government. However, active duty service by members of the National Guard or Reserves is counted.

Federal agencies employ more than half a million veterans, which is to say about one in every four civil servants has prior or existing military experience, according to the government's HR agency. In a memo to agency leaders in February, the Biden administration urged the creation and support of policies that would grant leave during employees' first year of work, when they may not yet have accrued enough time to be eligible for other benefits.

Officers whose nominations were blocked in Senate could get back pay

With hundreds of senior military officers finally headed into new leadership roles, a pair of senators is pushing for those newly confirmed officials to receive back pay and time-in-grade credit for their months spent waiting for advancement.

The proposal from Sens. Mike Rounds, R-S.D., and Joe Manchin, D-W.Va., would require approval from both the House and the Senate and could cost in excess of \$4 million, according to an analysis of the personnel involved by Military Times. Introduction of the Military Personnel Confirmation Restoration Act was first reported by Punchbowl News.

"The men and women who wear the uniform of the United States of America should not be negatively impacted by political squabbles," Rounds said in a statement accompanying the bill release.

The Senate confirmed 422 senior officers early this week after a nearly 10-month blockade of nominations by Sen. Tommy Tuberville, R-Ala., based on his objection to the Defense Department's abortion access policy.

Tuberville said the move was needed to highlight the "illegal" nature of the policy, put in place by administration officials without congressional consultation. The policy allows troops to receive leave time and travel stipends if they are forced to cross state lines for abortion services because of local restrictions on the procedures.

The blockade snarled hundreds of personnel moves across the top levels of the Defense Department, in some cases blocking promotions and pay raises for individual officers for nearly 10 months. By the end of October, the lost pay for the officers involved reached nearly \$700,000

With the confirmations now approved, Pentagon leaders said they are in the process of moving personnel into their new roles and finalizing promotions. That means most individuals involved will see their pay boosted later this month.



No more late-night alcohol sales at AAFES stores starting Jan. 1

Exchange-run stores on Army and Air Force installations will stop late-night alcohol sales, effective Jan. 1, in a move designed to help prevent suicides.

Alcohol will no longer be sold at Army & Air Force Exchange Service outlets between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. Shop hours vary by base and type of store.

The change will affect 161 shops worldwide, including Express stores, Class Six stores and main exchange stores. Those that sell booze overnight comprise about a quarter of AAFES stores that offer packaged alcohol and spirits, AAFES spokeswoman Marisa Conner said in an

Feedback about the decision has been "nominal," Conner said. Alcohol sales between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. at those 161 stores accounted for less than 1% of total alcohol sales last year, she said.

The move aligns Army and Air Force stores with the policies of other military exchange systems, Conner

Navy and Marine Corps exchanges stopped selling alcohol in any of their exchange outlets after 10 p.m.

in 2013. Navy policy allows sales of alcohol in exchange outlets from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m., while Marine Corps exchanges sell it from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. A limited number of military commissaries sell beer and wine, but commissaries are typically not open late.

The decision also follows the recommendations of a February report by the Department of Defense's Suicide Prevention and Response Independent Review Commit-

The panel cited research that suggests that limiting when alcohol can be sold reduces heavy drinking and other adverse outcomes associated with alcohol misuse. Cutting those hours may also offer a strategy for reducing overall alcohol consumption, especially among younger personnel who live in military housing, the committee reported.

Nearly 500 troops died by suicide in 2022, according to the Pentagon's latest annual suicide report released in October. While fewer people died, the active duty suicide rate rose by 3%, data showed.

Eighteen percent of service members who died by suicide had been diagnosed with an alcohol use disorder, the Pentagon found in 2021.

Nearly half of Naval Academy football players become Marines

Capt. Adam West already had plenty of reasons to become a Marine.

He had a family legacy of service in the Marine Corps, including an uncle and a cousin who were killed in action. He had grown up seeing the iconic images of the wars in the Middle East, with Marines bearing rifles, doing tough work.

But for the former U.S. Naval Academy football team offensive guard, there also was the yearning for a challenge. The sense that he could use his experience in a combative sport for a greater purpose.

"The Marine Corps brand is not welcoming, which is perhaps the most charming thing about it," said West, who is currently stationed at Marine Barracks Washington. "They're not interested in you. It's, 'Can you keep up?'

Each year, a strikingly large portion of the Naval Academy's football team decides to answer that question and pursue the Marine officer route.

Since 2014, 46% of the players have become Marines, according to academy spokesman Scott Strasemeier. That's compared to only 25% to 30% of Naval Academy midshipmen overall.

In November, 10 out of the 25 football players in the Class of 2024 received Marine Corps assignments, according to Strasemeier.

Football's high-contact nature has something in common with the Marine ethos, West said — in particular the infantry, where several of his teammates ended up.

"I don't want to compare football to real-life combat operations, but if you're a football player who's trained to think that way and use your skills in that way, it turns out a lot of the Marine Corps' mission is handson, imposing your will on someone directly," West said.

The message then Navy coach Ken Niumatalolo had for his players also aligned with Marine Corps culture, according to West: Be disciplined, be detailoriented, and find a way to win.

In West's view, the team's legacy of Marine Corps service is another reason many of the players are inspired to trade in their cleats for eagle, globe and an-

I will not try on boots, agree to an exfoliating hand massage, sample gourmet mustards, or take the tiniest whiff of perfume being spritzed my way. I must stick to my list, pay in cash, avoid anyone dressed up like an elf, and save some singles for the Salvation Army bucket.

I may not have Rudolph to guide me, but there's no need to cancel Christmas. This misfit shopper will make it through the holiday spending blizzard of 2023, and keep on climbing. Onward and up-


















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
