More partners sign on to hire military spouses

The Defense Department today signed up an additional 70 government organizations, nonprofits and private sector companies to participate in its Military Spouse Employment Partnership program. With the new additions, there are now more than 600 such organizations committed to recruiting, hiring, promoting and retaining military spouses.

Gilbert R. Cisneros Jr., the undersecretary of defense for personnel and readiness, welcomed the new companies into the partnership during an induction ceremony at the threeday MSEP Engage 2022 event in Northern Virginia.

"I want to welcome and congratulate and thank the more Spouse Employment Partnerthan 70 new employer partners ship here today," Cisneros said.

US economy returned to growth last quarter, expanding 2.6%

The U.S. economy grew at a better-thanexpected 2.6% annual rate from July through September, snapping two straight quarters of economic contraction and overcoming punishingly high inflation and interest rates.

Thursday's estimate from the Commerce Department showed that the nation's gross domestic product — the broadest gauge of economic output — grew in the third quarter after having shrunk in the first half of 2022. Stronger exports and steady consumer spending, backed by a healthy job market, helped

restore growth to the world's biggest economy.

Consumer spending, which accounts for about 70% of U.S. economic activity, expanded at a 1.4% annual pace, down from a 2% rate from April through June. Last quarter's growth also got a boost from exports, which shot up at an annual pace of 14.4%.

Housing investment, though, plunged at a 26% annual pace, hammered by surging mortgage rates as the Federal Reserve raises borrowing costs to combat chronic inflation.

The outlook for the overall economy has darkened. The Fed has raised interest rates five times this year and is set to do so again next week and in December. Chair Jerome Powell has warned that the Fed's hikes will bring "pain" in the form of higher unemployment and possibly a recession.

The government's latest GDP report comes as Americans, worried about inflation and the risk of recession, have begun to vote in midterm elections that will determine whether President Joe Biden's Democratic Party retains control of Congress. Inflation has become a signature issue for Republican attacks on the Democrats' stewardship of the econo-

USS Daniel Inouye rescues fishing vessel in vicinity of Hawaii

The Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer, USS Daniel Inouye (DDG 118), assisted the Commercial Fishing Vessel Sea Diamond in towing operation back to Honolulu following casualty to Sea Diamond's engine, in the vicinity of Hawaii Operating Area, (JBPHH), Octo-

In the early morning hours at approximately 12:30 a.m., USS Daniel Inouye received a call from the U.S. Coast Guard to assist the commercial fishing vessel Sea Diamond. Sea Diamond had lost all propulsion and reported a shafting propeller casualty.

Inouve was quick in her response and

contacted the vessel Sea Diamond at 2:00 a.m. During this time the engineering team deployed the ships rigid-hulled inflatable boat (RHIB) to assist. It was determined that the casualty to propulsion of Sea Diamond was external and the RHIB team would be unable to further support. Daniel Inouye then decided to take the Sea Diamond under tow back to Honolulu. The ship maintained a speed of 6 knots for approximately 12 hours before turning over custodianship to the Coast Guard five nautical miles outside of Honolulu Harbor.

Life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness are commonly considered an aspect of the American dream. However, according to Deloitte studies, only 13 percent of Americans are passionate about their career. Gunnery Sgt. Michael D. Watts, a food service specialist and acting enlisted aid for the commander of Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, Marine Forces Command, Marine Forces Northern Command, has found himself to be part of the few who turned a hobby into a profession he enjoys.

Watts grew up in the metropolitan suburb of Salt Lake City known as Sandy, Utah. He was the eldest of five boys, each born with a disability. Watts had to take on a parental role prematurely in order to take care of his siblings throughout his youth.

"I developed a lot of responsibility

and maturity at a young age," Watts continued. "I had to grow up faster, being the oldest and having a family with many disabilities, but that's life. It developed a lot of who I am."

At 14 years old, and an evergrowing sense of responsibility, Watts began to work in a Chinese restaurant called Hong Kong Cafe. He was quickly promoted to line cook and discovered a newfound passion. Due to caretaking having such an influence on his life, cooking felt like second na-

"When I served food to people, I enjoyed the satisfaction of giving to others," Watts reflected. "I applied to put a little extra money in my pocket but it turned out I genuinely loved my

While working at Hong Kong Cafe and continuing to help his family, Watts played the drums in his free time. Music became an outlet for freedom and expression.

Economy

With inflation still near a 40-year high, steady price spikes have been pressuring households across the country. At the same time, rising interest rates have derailed the housing market and are likely to inflict broader damage over time. The outlook for the world economy, too, grows bleaker the longer that Russia's war against Ukraine

Last quarter's U.S. economic growth reversed annual declines of 1.6% from January through March and 0.6% from April through June. Consecutive quarters of declining economic output are one informal definition of a recession. But most economists have said they believe the economy skirted a recession, noting the still-resilient job market and steady spending by consumers. Most of them have expressed concern, though, that a recession is likely next year as the Fed steadily tightens

Preston Caldwell, head of U.S. econom ics for the financial services firm Morningstar, noted that the economy's contraction in the first half of the year was caused largely by factors that don't reflect its underlying health and so "very likely did not constitute a genuine economic slowdown." He pointed, for example, to a drop in business inventories, a cyclical event that tends to reverse itself over time.

Higher borrowing costs have weakened the home market, in particular. The average rate on a 30-year fixed-rate mortgage, just 3.09% a year ago, is approaching 7%. Sales of existing homes have fallen for eight straight months. Construction of new homes is down nearly 8% from a year

Still, the economy retains pockets of strength. One is the vitally important job market. Employers have added an average of 420,000 jobs a month this year, putting 2022 on track to be the second-best year for job creation (behind 2021) in Labor Department records going back to 1940. The unemployment rate was 3.5% last month, matching a half-century low.

Hiring has been decelerating, though. In September, the economy added 263,000 jobs - solid but the lowest total since April

It happens every time my [husband/ wife] receives orders. My behavior doesn't change at first, but as our move dates get closer and closer, I slowly withdraw into my own chaotic, stressed, little world. My normal everyday

thoughts about [insert thoughts, e.g., dog hair, power walks, coffee, defrosting chicken, Friday night fire pits] are slowly replaced, one by one, with frantic ramblings and strange inner voices, until I become a military spouse precariously perched on the threshold of moving insanity.

"How did we accumulate all this crap? We need more plastic storage bins! What if I forget to call about turning off the cable? We have to spackle that hole in the wall before the hous-ing inspection! What if we go over the weight limit again? Why haven't I taken the stickers off the furniture from our last

Be forewarned. In the days before the packers arrive, I'll become so self-absorbed, I'll be incapable of normal social interaction. In a subconscious attempt to repel other humans and thereby minimize distractions, I'll stop showering, brushing my hair, and applying deodorant. I'll become so hell-bent on using up our food, I'll concoct strange casseroles with things like pork chops, oyster crackers, canned green beans, raisins and tater tots. I'll walk around the house armed with Sharpie markers and a clipboard, muttering something about zip lock baggies and duct tape,

my left eye twitching from a stressinduce tick.

It's not a pretty sight. But at this point, I really don't care about my rat's nest hairdo, the drool on my chin, the neighborhood pot luck, the next episode of Survivor, or you. Because all I can think about it one thing: Our Next

As I write this, I have exactly [insert number days until the moving company arrives to pack up every coffee cup, photo album, extension cord, lounge chair, lampshade, screw driver, text book, holiday ornament, bicycle, pencil and picture frame we own.

The reason I like you is because you understand. Until our household goods arrive at their new destination, until we find the towels and sheets and dishes and TV remote and coffee maker, and until I flop down on the couch in our new home and take a deep breath — I won't realize how much I really miss
