NAS Meridian Sailors Remember 9/11

Enlisted Navy sailors, officers and first responders gathered together Wednesday on board Naval Air Station Meridian to mark the 23rd anniversary of the 2001 terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center and Pentagon.

On Sept. 11, 2001, 19 terrorists belonging to the Islamist extremist group al-Qaida hijacked four commercial airplanes and used them in suicide attacks. The first plane hit the north tower at the World Trade Center at 8:46 a.m. and the second hit the south tower at 9:03 a.m.

At 9:37 a.m. a third hijacked plane hit the Pentagon, and the fourth plane crashed in rural Pennsylvania shortly after 10 a.m. after passengers on the flight revolted to keep the hijackers from reaching their target. Almost 3,000 people died in the attacks.

Chief Select Tinamarie Anthony said she was in her sixth grade math class at school in north New Jersey when the attacks took place. The school, she said, was not far from Manhattan, where the World Trade Center stood, and students could see the black smoke rising into the air.

"As soon as we heard that there was a crash, that a plane had crashed into the World Trade Center, we all got up and we started looking out the windows of our classroom, which we did see the billowing smoke," she said. "A couple moments later it turned into a lot of chaos, a lot of mayhem because parents were scared."

This was before cell phones were common, Anthony explained, but the classroom did have a phone on

the wall and soon it was ringing off the hook. Many students were sent to the office to await the arrival of their parents who wanted to take them home, she said.

"Luckily for me, my dad worked at that school. He was the gym teacher," she said. "So I really felt really safe knowing I was with my dad."

No school was held on Sept. 12, she said, but students did go back to class on Sept. 13 with a late schedule.

Master Chief Amy Madrigal said 9/11 is something she normally tries to avoid talking about as it is a difficult subject. She was at the Pentagon when that plane hit and very close to being in its path.

"I was in corridor four, which, if you know where the plane hit, it was between corridors four and five," she said.

The experience, she said, really drove home the sobering reality of the oath Navy sailors take to put their lives on the line if needed. As a 19-to-20-year-old junior sailor, the full weight of that oath doesn't really sink in, she said, but the events of 9/11 showed her just how serious it was.

"At that age, you kind of don't think that's for real, but it became very real to me very quickly," she said.

The attack, however, also served as a catalyst, Madrigal said, giving her the motivation she needed to grow as a person and as a sailor.

"When I first started in the Navy, I was a little hard-headed. If you ever were to talk to my mentors, they'll tell you I had a rough start," she said. "But Sept. 11 was the day that changed my life because that was the day I knew I was meant for something bigger."

Chief Heritage Week Aboard USS Constitution

During the week, Constitution Sailors teach the selectees a variety of time-honored maritime evolutions while living and working aboard the ship. USS Constitution, is the world's oldest commissioned warship afloat, and played a crucial role in the Barbary Wars and the War of 1812, actively defending sea lanes from 1797 to 1855. During normal operations, the active-duty Sailors stationed aboard USS Constitution provide free tours and offer public visitation to more than 600,000 people a year as they support the ship's mission of promoting the Navy's history and maritime heritage and raising awareness of the importance of a sustained naval presence. USS Constitution was undefeated in battle and destroyed or captured 33 opponents. The ship earned the nickname of Old Ironsides during the War of 1812 when British cannonballs were seen bouncing off the ship's wooden hull.

Captain's Virtual Suggestion Box: Questions & Answers



Q. Good Evening Sir, I was wondering if we had the funding or could get the funding to expand the parking lots out here at both the wing and Air Operations? Or at least have some gravel to park on. We've been having issues with the amount of space for people to park. And also, can we get the lines repainted on the back side of the parking lot?

A. A site survey has been completed, and we have developed a plan for an expanded gravel parking lot with 315 additional spaces. We are currently awaiting funding and hope

to secure it in FY-25 to move forward with this project.

Q. Staff night is great how about if Rudders did a special for Monday night football. Like .25 cent wings and happy hour drink prices.

A. MWR is considering more evening events. This will be a phased approach as hiring allows, in the meantime Thursday is now Staff Night (1700-2100). Rudders is now open Monday-Wednesday from 0700-1600, Thursday from 0700-1220, Friday 0700-2200, Saturday 1400-2200 and Sunday

Q. I have been to the ID lab 3 times with a locked CAC and all 3 times- no one is present. The workers show up late to work- never opens on time and we end up sitting waiting on them. If the hours on the door are standardsomeone should always be present.

A. The DEERS office opens daily between 7:15 and 7:20 AM. A. Thank you for your suggestion. We'll work on coordinating with all necessary parties to explore the feasibility of implementing this idea.

A. The omelet grill operates from 0530 to 0700, closing at 0700 for cleaning and prep. We discontinued Caesar dressing due to spoilage and low demand but will offer a small quantity to assess interest before deciding on its future. Hispanic, Navy Medicine Flag **Officer Shares His Story During Hispanic Heritage Observance**

Military and civilian personnel gathered at the Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division (NAWCWD), with many more joining via live stream, to celebrate the 2024 Hispanic Heritage Observance, Sep. 10.

The event, themed "Pioneers of Change: Shaping the Future Together," highlighted the contributions of Hispanic Americans to the Navy and the Nation, and featured keynote speaker Rear Adm. Guido Valdes, commander of Naval Medical Forces Pacific and director of Defense Health Network Pacific Rim, who shared how his heritage shaped his Naval career and leadership in Navy Medicine.

Valdes, a Puerto Rico and Miami native of Cuban descent, began by reflecting on the diversity of Hispanic experiences in the United States, which now accounts for 20 percent of the population.

"Hispanicity in our country is represented by a diverse human tapestry resulting from a variety of historical events, migrations, and individual choices," Valdes said.

Despite this diversity, Valdes emphasized three core values that bind Hispanic culture-family, faith, and languagevalues that deeply influenced his life and

Born to Cuban immigrants who fled the Castro regime, Valdes shared the story of his family's migration to the U.S. His parents left Cuba in 1965 with nothing but what they could carry in a suitcase. They rebuilt their lives in Puerto Rico, aided by the generosity of fellow Cuban exiles and the welcoming Puerto Rican people. Valdes explained how his parents' resilience and success as small business owners instilled in him a sense of humility and gratitude for the opportunities the American society has

Reflecting on this experience, Valdes noted how it shaped his attitude toward opportunity and risk.

When offered an opportunity, take it; put in the effort, make it; when you reap the rewards, share it," he said.

Valdes emphasized that this lesson has guided him throughout his military career and leadership roles. He also noted that as a leader, it is critical to "take risks on those willing to do those three things," reinforcing the importance of investing in people who demonstrate hard work, perseverance, and a willingness to seize opportunities.



MARINE CORPS LOGISTICS BASE ALBANY, GA --Augmented Reality (AR) and Virtual Reality (VR) are set to play pivotal roles in transforming telemaintenance operations, ensuring that maintainers are always available to support the Marine on any front at any

Bridging the Gap. Tele-maintenance, the remote diagnosis and repair equipment, has traditionally relied on phone calls and manual instructions. However, the arrival of AR and VR technologies promises to take maintenance capabilities to an entirely new level. By overlaying digital information onto the real world (AR) or creating fully immersive virtual environments (VR), these technologies provide a more intuitive and effective way for technicians to perform maintenance tasks remotely.

AR can significantly enhance the diagnostic process by allowing remote experts to visualize the exact conditions that field technicians are encountering. For instance, a technician wearing AR glasses can receive step-by-step guidance directly in their line of sight,

with holographic overlays highlighting parts and tools needed for a specific This real-time, hands-free assistance minimizes errors and speeds up the repair process.

Maintenance Command has been experimenting with AR technologies as part of its effort to modernize its maintenance capabilities from industrial-era practices to technologies suitable and capable of meeting the demands of the Information Age. The implementation of the "Industry 5.0 Framework" includes increasing production planning, control, and execution of capabilities by optimizing and automating business processes and optimization of facilities, business processes, and technology. As part of the effort, the command has actively engaged in experimentation and testing of AR capabilities since September 2022 and is gaining a better understanding of how it can be integrated into the command's current and future capabilities.
