Welcome CNO Admiral Caudle

Adm. Daryl Caudle assumed the duties as the 34th Chief of Naval Operations (CNO) during an assumption of office ceremony, attended by over 300 Department of Defense (DoD) senior leaders, distinguished guests and families at the Washington Navy Yard in Washington D.C., Aug. 25.

The CNO is a member of the Joint Chief of Staff and serves as an advisor to the President of the United States, the National Security Council, the Homeland Security Council, and the Secretary of Defense and is responsible for the command, utilization of resources, and operating efficiency of worldwide naval forces and shore activities.

"As I step into the role as your 34th Chief of Naval Operations, I do so with great pride, immense gratitude, and an absolute focus on the mission ahead," Caudle said in


During the ceremony he further discussed his priorities of Sailors, operational readiness and fleet modernization.

"The Sailor will be front and center in my vision throughout my tenure as CNO - hands down, no exception," said Caudle during the ceremony. "To ensure that they are ready to fight and win decisively-today, tomorrow, and well into the future—we will view everything we do we through an operational lens focused on three priorities: the foundry, the fleet, and the way we fight." Secretary of the Navy John Phelan acted as the presiding officer and keynote speaker of the ceremony highlighting the importance of the Navy and the prioritization of future shipbuilding development.

"Admiral Caudle, 'the honey badger,' is the right man for the job," said Secretary Phelan. "He has a reputation for challenging the status quo, demanding results and refusing to accept excuses. I look forward to seeing

Events marking 80th commemoration of end of World War II offer time for reflection

Access to Ford Island and other areas on Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickman are usually off limits to the general public, but from Aug. 30 to Sept. 2, Hawaii residents had an opportu-

nity to visit the base to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II. The open base event included ceremonies and activities on Ford Island, at the Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum and on the Battleship Missouri Memorial. World War II included combatants from the

majority of the world's nations and is considered the deadliest war in history with an astounding 85 million military and civilian casualties. The devastating conflict ended on Sept. 2, 1945, when Japanese officials signed the documents for surrender aboard the battleship USS Missouri (BB 63) moored in Tokyo Bay, returning peace to a world that was forever changed.

On Aug. 30, Hawaii residents and Navy Sailors leading tours of the USS Decatur (DDG 73), an Arleigh Burke-class Aegis guided missile destroyer, reflected on the enduring legacy of World War II and the significance of the commemoration.

"When you really look at World War II, we didn't know we were going to win that war and the beginning of the war wasn't going our way," said Capt. Jordan Bergman, an Army military intelligence officer, before joining the Decatur tour with his family. "But due to American grit and the bravery of a lot of young people, they actually pushed through and won the war."

Bergman has a personal connection to loss and sacrifice. His great grandfather was a Marine who died on his 18th birthday and his great uncle died in the Battle of the Bulge, one of the bloodiest battles of World

Iwo Jima Marine reunites with Sherman Tank after 80 years

MARINE CORPS BASE QUANTICO, Va. -- The National Museum of the Marine Corps reunited a World War II veteran with the tank he drove during the Battle of Iwo Jima, in a ceremony held Aug. 15 at the Museum Support Facility.

In a powerful moment of living history on the 80th anniversary of Japan's surrender in World War II, Cpl. Leighton Willhite, 100, stood beside "Lucky," the very M4A3 Sherman tank he drove ashore during the assault on Iwo Jima in 1945. He was joined by his son, grandson and great-grandson.

"It's amazing," Willhite said. "I never thought I would see the tank again. That tank was my life."

At just 19 years old, Willhite landed with C Company, 5th Tank Battalion, in Lucky during the opening assault on Iwo Jima. Lucky was among the Marine Corps' newest standard tanks and saw its combat debut on the island. Willhite's crew supported Marines near Hill 362A, north of Mount Suribachi, and carried out rescue missions under heavy fire.

In one defining moment, when a fellow tank, Jeannie, became trapped, Willhite volunteered to cover his commander, Lt. Leonard Blake, as they moved to rescue the crew. Willhite was awarded the Bronze Star with "V" device for valor, and Blake received the Silver Star.

After the battle, Lucky returned to Hawaii in April 1945 and was one of 72 tanks selected for conversion into CB-H5 flamethrower tanks in preparation for the planned invasion of Japan. Following the war, Lucky was transferred to Camp Lejeune, N.C., where it remained largely unnoticed, in the woods of 2nd Tank Battalion's training areas, until the early 2000s, when it was recovered and entered the Museum's collection. At the time, its historical significance was not yet known.

Its true identity came to light in 2023, when Jon Bernstein, the Museum's Arms & Armor Curator, conducted a routine inspection of the tank, then on loan to the Pima Air & Space Museum in Tucson, Arizona. During the inspection, Bernstein noticed a set of distinctive weld scars, marks unique to the 5th Tank Battalion's improvised self-protection modifications for Iwo Jima.

Through careful analysis of those scars, along with field modifications and comparisons to archival photographs and historical records, Bernstein was able to positively identify the tank as belonging to C Company, 5th Tank Battalion. Further paint excavation revealed the name "Lucky" and the unit's tactical markings, confirming not only the tank's battlefield role but also its direct connection to its original crew, including Cpl. Willhite.

Today, Lucky is one of only six confirmed Sherman tanks from Iwo Jima still in existence.

"Today is the end of the beginning and is the culmination of two years of research and piecing the story together. To bring Cpl. Willhite back together

with the tank he drove in battle is to bring that story to life." said Jon Bernstein, National Museum of the Marine Corps' Arms & Armor Curator

This reunion carried even greater meaning because 2025 marks the 80th anniversary of Emperor Hirohito announcing Japan's surrender and ending World War II. For Willhite, who celebrated his 100th birthday on April 9, standing beside Lucky once more was more than just a personal milestone—it was a living reminder of the service and sacrifice of Marines in one of the Corps' most pivotal battles.

As the number of World War II veterans dwindles each year, gatherings like this become increasingly rare and precious. They offer something no book or artifact alone can provide: the chance to see history embodied in those who lived it.

"Having Cpl. Willhite here, standing beside this tank again after 80 years, is very special," said Museum Director Keil Gentry. "It is a powerful reminder of the courage and sacrifice that defined the Marines who fought on Iwo Jima."

Lucky's journey is far from over. It is now undergoing a meticulous restoration to its 1945 appearance, so that future visitors will not only see the tank but also sense the bond it once shared with the Marines who fought beside it. For generations to come, Lucky will stand as a storyteller in steel, carrying forward the legacy of those who battled on Iwo Jima.



War II that resulted in an Allied victory.

After the tour, Bergman and his family planned to visit the Battleship Missouri Memorial and watch an airshow featuring radio-controlled pilot performances at the Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum.

Retail Services Specialist Chief Selectee Shelton Talaro has been stationed aboard the USS Decatur for the past five months and was excited to lead tours for Hawaii families.

"A lot of people don't have the opportunity to come to Navy ships besides the USS Missouri, so to have them come aboard and learn a little bit about the ship and its history is very positive," he said. "Hopefully, they'll be able to pass down this information to their families and friends and then if they have the opportunity to come back to another ship, then they get to all experience the same thing."

Jin Onuma, who has lived in Hawaii for 20 years, said that learning more about the sacrifices service members made was sad to think about but it makes her grateful for the life she and her family have today. She and her husband and their 13-year-old son enjoyed their tour of the USS Decatur. "Many different carriers and ships are here. Whenever there's an opportunity, I try to come out so I can see what I can learn from that," she said.

Tour guide and Gunner's Mate 2nd Class John Urban "Goose" Giese, who has been stationed aboard the Decatur for 27 months, said he has great respect for the gunners of WWII and how they set the standard for Sailors today.

"Gunners lead the way. In World War II, you had Gunner's Mates, Boatswain's Mates, right hand rates, just carrying the weight and doing all the tough stuff," he said, noting that all the gunners he knows continue to work hard to get the job done.

Right arm rates were Sailors in the Seaman Branch, which included roles such as Boatswain's Mates, Gunner's Mates and Quartermasters who wore their rank insignia on the right sleeve of their uniforms. In 1949, all rate insignia were moved to the left sleeve. Right arm rate is a term still used in the Navy today that describes Sailors who are "salty" or tough.

Giese gave a shout out to his hero, Gunner's Mate 3rd Class Paul Henry Carr, who was stationed aboard the USS Samuel B. Roberts (DE 413) and manned a 5-inch gun during a battle in the Philippines.

Carr wouldn't leave his post until his gun dropped below the water line. He was posthumously awarded the Silver Star Medal "for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity as Gun Captain on the USS Samuel B. Roberts. He gallantly gave his life for his country." Carr also earned the Purple Heart, Presidential Unit Citation, and the Award of the Philippine Republic of Presidential Unit Citation Badge. A guided missile frigate, the USS Carr (FFG-52), was named in his honor in 1985.

Bergman reflected on the sacrifices made by service members who served during World War II and those who safeguard the United States today. "I'm happy to see that people are willing to take the oath and sacrifice the best years of their life so that other people can be home safely at night."

Commemoration events include an air show by the Liberty Jump Team; the premiere of "Miles Morale and Memories: Bob Hope and WWII," a movie about the contributions of a legendary performer who traveled more than 80,000 miles during World War II to entertain troops; and a gala attended by USS Missouri crew members who witnessed the Japanese surrender in Tokyo Bay.

During his remarks Caudle emphasized his gratitude to his family and especially his wife, Donna Caudle, for their steadfast support throughout his 40-year career.

"Your influence is woven into the very fabric of my being, into every decision I've ever made," said Caudle, addressing his family. "From the moment we met, you've been the bedrock of my life. You're the anchor that has kept me grounded, especially in the sometimes turbulent seas of this profession."

As a native of Winston-Salem, North Carolina and a 1985 graduate of North Carolina State University, Caudle is a proud member of the "Wolfpack."

Caudle's previous three assignments were commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command; commander, Submarine Forces; and commander, Submarine Force Atlantic. Vice Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Jim Kilby relinquished the office of the CNO after serving as the acting CNO from February to August 2025.

Caudle and Phelan commended Kilby for his leadership, ensuring the uninterrupted performance of the Navy's mission and continuing to foster positive relationships with our allies and partners.

USS Abraham Lincoln Carrier Strike Group completes Exercise North Edge

NORTH PACIFIC OCEAN - The USS Abraham Lincoln (CVN 72) Carrier Strike Group (ABECSG) wrapped up participation in the U.S. Indo-Pacific Commandled joint force exercise Northern Edge 2025 from the North Pacific Ocean, Aug,

Over the course of nine days, from the Gulf of Alaska out through the Aleutian Island chain, in the air, on land, and at sea, the ABECSG demonstrated the full power and capability of a U.S. Navy carrier strike group. The 5,000 Sailors and Marines of the ABECSG successfully completed a variety of exercise events across multiple domains, leveraging the unique capacity a CSG brings to the joint force.

Flagship Abraham Lincoln, with the embarked CSG-3 staff, served as the command and control hub for the strike group, directing operations across a multi-dimensional battlespace hundreds of nautical miles wide. The ship hosted Adm. Christopher Grady, Vice Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff; U.S. Senators Lisa Murkowski and Dan Sullivan, and other military and civilian leaders from across Alaska and the U.S. government, reaffirming the strategic importance of aircraft carriers in signaling U.S. resolve and operational reach.

"I am incredibly proud of the Abraham Lincoln crew and their performance throughout Northern Edge," said Capt. Daniel Keeler, commanding officer of Abraham Lincoln. "This has been a demanding but incredibly rewarding opportunity. Operating in Alaska alongside the joint force and our Canadian allies, we displayed not only our ship's unique capabilities as the flagship of the world's most powerful carrier strike group, but also the dedication, technical acumen, and strength of Lincoln Nation."

Sailing alongside Abraham Lincoln were three Arleigh Burke-class guidedmissile destroyers, fulfilling a variety of roles over the course of the exercise. Complicated scenarios at sea demanded professionalism, skill, and expertise from these crews. They performed admirably, sustaining maritime superiority in an integrated maritime domain.

"Northern Edge offered an invaluable opportunity for our ships and crews to refine the full spectrum of surface warfare in a challenging and geographically strategic location," said Capt. Allison Christy, commanding officer, Destroyer Squadron (DESRON) 21. "Our destroyers demonstrated the readiness, lethality, and teamwork required to fight and win as part of a carrier strike group, alongside our counterparts across the joint force.'

Taking place over a vast expanse of territory around Alaska, including the Joint Pacific Alaska Range Complex (JPARC), Joint Base Elmendorf-Richardson, Eielson Air Force Base, and Dutch Harbor, among others, this exercise emphasized both the ability to project power far across the Pacific and the capacity to defend the home front.

A variety of scenario events undertaken by Carrier Air Wing (CVW) 9 were integral to reinforcing the strike group's ability to deliver effects throughout the exercise area. Aircraft from CVW-9, ABECSG's embarked air wing, performed defensive counter-air, maritime strike missions, and expeditionary advanced base operations across the Alaskan waterspace and the Aleutian Islands. In the skies above and around Alaska, CVW-9 logged over 3,000 flight hours and more than 1,100 sorties in support of exercise requirements.

"This exercise tested the SHOGUN Warriors of CVW-9 in a wide range of demanding missions, from long range maritime strike to operating in an expeditionary manner forward deployed in Alaska's challenging conditions," said Capt. William "Tank" Frank, Commander, Carrier Air Wing NINE. "The professionalism and adaptability of our team proved once again that this Air Wing is ready to deliver combat power anytime, anywhere, no matter how contested the environment. The many hours of tactical flying don't reflect all of the mission planning, aircraft maintenance, and preparation our aviators and maintainers put forward to accomplish our objectives. The Naval Aviation team continues to set the standard for responsiveness and warfighting

Petersen Jr. (DDG 121), and the nine squadrons of CVW-9, including an F-35C Lightning II squadron, the "Black Knights" of Marine Fighter Attack Squadron (VMFA) 314; three

F/A-18E/F Super Hornet squadrons, the "Tophatters" of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 14; "Black Aces" of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 41, the "Vigilantes" of Strike Fighter Squadron (VFA) 151; the "Wizards" of Electronic Attack Squadron (VAQ) 133, operating the EA-18G Growler; the "Wallbangers" of Carrier Airborne Early Warning Squadron (VAW) 117, operating the E-2D Advanced Hawkeye; the "Chargers" of Helicopter Sea Combat Squadron (HSC) 14 operating the MH-60S Sea Hawk; and the "Raptors" of Helicopter Maritime Strike Squadron (HSM) 71, operating the MH-60R Sea Hawk.

USS Bulkeley arrives in Rostock, Germany in preparation for Northern Coast 2025

ROSTOK, Germany - The Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer USS Bulkeley (DDG 84) arrived in Rostock, Germany for a scheduled port visit to enhance international relations and strengthen NATO Alliance cohesion, Aug. 27.

"Bulkeley is incredibly eager to participate in Northern Coast 2025 with our NATO allies. It's a unique opportunity to strengthen our maritime relationships with our Baltic allies while demonstrating U.S. resolve," said Cmdr. Mike Schelcher, commanding officer of Bulkeley. "Our interoperability with NATO allies strengthens the region, ensuring that vital sea lanes remain open and unthreatened by deterring any adversary who would disrupt the region."

An estimated 14 nations are gearing up to participate in Northern Coast 2025 (NoCo25), a multinational German led exercise in the Baltic with as many as 40 ships involved and around 2,700 personnel.

This exercise was first launched by

the German Navy in 2007 and is part of the larger Quadriga 2025 exercise series that will model realistic threat scenarios on land, sea and in the air.

While in port Rostock, the ship's leadership will meet with local and military leadership, while the crew will participate in a community relations through a guided ship tour and cultural exchange.

"The interoperability planning and training we do alongside the Baltic navies is invaluable," said Cmdr. Anthony LaVopa, Executive Officer of Bulkeley. "We learn from them, they learn from us, and in the end, we become a more cohesive team. It's a real-world demonstration that we are stronger together".

As NATO Allies, the U.S. and German Navy routinely operate together to build combined maritime interoperability. Bulkeley is deployed to the European theater of operations and is assigned to Commander U.S. Sixth Fleet. The ship participates in a range of maritime activities in support of U.S. Sixth Fleet and NATO Allies.







