U.S. flowing military supplies to Israel, as country battles Hamas terrorists

The United States is flowing military supplies to Israel as the country battles against Hamas terrorists, President Joe Biden said.

"We stand with Israel," the president said during an announcement at the White House.

The Hamas attack has been exceptionally brutal with hundreds of Israeli civilians killed and thousands wounded in the surprise attack out of Gaza that began Saturday.

"There's still so many families desperately waiting to hear the fate of their loved ones, not knowing if they are alive or dead or hostages," the president said.

Hamas gunmen also kidnapped civilians and now leaders of the group have threatened to execute them. "The brutality of Hamas, its bloodthirstiness, brings to mind the worst rampages of ISIS," Biden said. "This is terrorism." including ammunition, and interceptors to replenish Iron Dome. We are going to make sure that Israel does not run out of these critical assets to defend its cities and its citizens."

Biden said that he will ask Congress "to take urgent action to fund the national security requirements of our critical partners. This is not about party or politics; this is about the security of our world, security of the United States of America."

The United States has also enhanced its military force posture in the region to strengthen deterrence. DOD has moved the USS Gerald R. Ford Carrier Strike Group to the eastern Mediterranean and bolstered fighter aircraft presence in the region.

These moves are not to deter Hamas, but any country or group that may think of taking advantage of the instability and confusion to pursue their own ends. "To any country, any organization, anyone thinking of taking advantage of the situation, I have one word: Don't," Biden said. "Our hearts may be broken but our resolve is clear." National Security Advisor Jake Sullivan said there are U.S. citizens among the hostages Hamas has taken. "We are working with the Israeli government and with our regional partners on every aspect of the hostage crisis, including sharing intelligence and deploying experts from across the U.S. government to advise the Israeli government and coordinate with them on hostage recovery efforts," he said during a White House news conference. • Israel, page 2

Sullivan said military supplies are already flowing into Israel with interceptors for the Iron Dome missile defense shield leading the way. "We will be flowing in additional Iron Dome interceptors so that [the Israelis] have the capabilities they need to sustain their Iron Dome defense systems," he said. "We're also looking at other ways that we can help augment their air defense capabilities."

Iranian leaders "have provided capabilities, they have provided support, and they have had engagement in contact with Hamas over years and years," he said. "All of that has played a role in contributing to what we have seen now. As to the question of whether Iran knew about this attack in advance, or helped plan or direct this attack? We do not, as of the moment ... have confirmation."

Future USS Jack Lucas sails away from Ingalls

The Navy's newest guided-missile destroyer, the future USS Jack H. Lucas (DDG 125), sailed away from the Huntington Ingalls Industries' (HII) Ingalls Shipbuilding Division shipyard, Sept 26.

USS Jack H. Lucas (DDG 125) departs Ingalls Shipbuilding in Pascagoula, Miss. DDG-125 will be commissioned Oct. 7 at a ceremony in Tampa, Florida, before sailing to homeport in San Diego.

"Sail away of the first Flight III Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer is a historical event for the program," said Capt. Seth Miller, the DDG 51 program manager at the Arleigh Burke-class program office, Program Executive Office, Ships. "The Navy continues to field cutting-edge warfighting capability that will ply the oceans and

deter our adversaries for decades to come."

DDG-125 will be commissioned Oct. 7, 2023 at a ceremony in Tampa, Florida before sailing to its homeport in San Diego

DDG-125 is named for Pfc. Jacklyn Harold "Jack" Lucas, who served in the U.S. Marines during World War II, earning the Medal of Honor for his heroism at Iwo Jima, when he was just 17 years old. He is the youngest Marine, and the youngest serviceman in World War II, to be awarded the United States' highest military decoration for valor. In 1961, he returned to military service as a captain in the U.S. Army and trained younger troops headed for Vietnam.

U.S. Iraq and Kuwait wrap up trilateral exercise

Maritime forces from Iraq, Kuwait and the United States completed a twoday trilateral exercise focusing on counter-piracy and maritime security in the Northern Arabian Gulf, Oct. 3.

The Sentinel-class U.S. Coast Guard fast response cutters USCGC Robert Goldman (WPC 1142) and USCGC Clarence Sutphin Jr. (WPC 1146) teamed with Kuwait Coast Guard fast patrol boat Wadhah (P 316), Kuwait Coast Guard speed boat (400), Kuwait Navy supply ship KNS Al-dorrar, Kuwait Navy patrol boat KNS Failaka, Kuwait Navy coastal patrol boat KNS Bateel 3 and KNS Bateel 4, a Kuwait helicopter, Iraq Navy patrol boat PB-307 and Iraq Navy patrol boat PB-310 to conduct joint patrols focused on visit, board, search, and

seizure (VBSS) procedures, small boat operations, fishermen safety, and communication equipment checks, among many maritime security concerns.

This exercise builds upon previous VBSS engagement training by introducing simulated target vessels, increased VBSS drill repetitions and, as a first, conducting VBSS exercises aboard Kuwaiti ships.

Six years ago, the trilateral exercise concept was driven by the three partner nations' desire to cooperatively address maritime security concerns in the Arabian Gulf. Since that time, the exercises have grown in complexity and are more focused on regional needs.

DOD remains focused on deterrence in Indo-Pacific

The U.S. remains fully committed to its strategy of integrated deterrence in the Indo-Pacific while keeping a close eye on China's provocations in the region, a senior Pentagon official said today.

A group of U.S. and foreign military ships transit in open waters.

Ely S. Ratner, assistant secretary of defense for Indo-Pacific security affairs, said conflict with China is not inevitable despite indications that Beijing is increasingly leveraging its military to spread its malign influence abroad.

Previewing the forthcoming 2023 China Military Power Report, Ratner said DOD assesses that the Chinese Communist Party is increasingly turning to its military as "an instrument of coercion in support of their revisionist aims" with an eye toward restructuring the international order and undermining global peace and stability.

That assessment, he said, is evidenced by China's rapid expansion of its nuclear forces and increasing provocations by its air and naval forces against U.S. allies and partners operating in the region under accordance with international law.

Navy 'tracks' Iranian ships with unmanned systems in Strait of Hormuz

Traditionally crewed ships and aircraft teamed up with 12 unmanned platforms to conduct enhanced maritime security operations in the Strait of Hormuz last month.

The exercise involved "tracking" Iranian navy and Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps navy ships and small boats in the region, according to U.S. Naval Forces Central Command.

"The integration of new, multidomain unmanned platforms into routine fleet operations provides more 'eyes on the water,' enhancing maritime domain awareness and increasing deterrence in the region," said Vice Adm. Brad Cooper, commander of U.S. Naval Forces Central Command and U.S. 5th Fleet, in a Navy news release Friday.

The operation came after the Navy sent the amphibious assault ship Bataan and dock landing ship Carter Hall, with more than 3,000 sailors and Marines embarked, to U.S. 5th Fleet in July to bolster scurity in the region.

That move was in response to recent attempts by Iran to harass and seize merchant vessels. U.S. Central Command claims Iran has attacked or seized approximately 20 vessels since 2021.

These unmanned platforms can assist keeping navigation safe and promoting the free flow of commerce in the region, Cooper said.

This enhanced maritime security serves as a deterrent against malign activity and strengthens regional stability, which is good for everybody," he said.

The Navy did not disclose which type of unmanned platforms participated in the exercise, but said they included underwater, surface and aerial vehicles. Seven task forces were involved.

Capt. Joe Baggett, director of maritime operations for U.S. Naval Forces Central Command and U.S. 5th Fleet, noted that the command has operated unmanned systems for years, but said "manned-unmanned teaming" operations will become the norm moving forward.

"Adding our new USVs, and then integrating all of these platforms into fleet operations, is how we expect to fly and sail well into the future," Baggett said in the release.

Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro told Navy Times' sister publication, Defense News, in December 2022 that integrating unmanned platforms into maritime operations would require perfecting the technology so they can operate safely and independently, and ensuring that the Navy develops a concept of operations needed to "match the unmanned technology with the manned technology."

"The third part of that is continue to refine the training and the cultural changes that are necessary so we can train our workforce to be able to integrate those technologies into our warfighting structure, as well as provide the data, the intel and the warfighting capability necessary to support the joint force," Del Toro said.

The Department of Defense has deployed multiple assets to deter Iranian maritime hostility.

In addition to the Bataan and Carter Hall, the department sent Air Force F-35 and F-16 fighter jets and the destroyer Thomas Hudner to the region in July after Iran tried to seize two oil tankers in the Strait of Hormuz and the Gulf of Oman on July 5.

In one instance, an Iranian ship fired upon one of the merchant vessels, Pentagon press secretary Sabrina Singh told reporters in July. The U.S. Navy destroyer Mc-Faul intervened in both cases and the Iranian vessels subsequently departed the scene.

Last month, Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps navy shined a laser at a Marine Corps AH-1Z Viper attack helicopter assigned to the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit deployed with the Bataan.

"These are not the actions of a professional maritime force," U.S. Naval Forces Central Command spokesman Cmdr. Rick Chernitzer said in a statement last month. "This unsafe, unprofessional and irresponsible behavior by the Iranian Revolutionary Guard Corps navy risks U.S. and partner nation lives and needs to cease immediately."

Leaders face questions over rent increases, spouse employment and more

When the Defense Department announces increases in the Basic Allowance for Housing, sometimes rents immediately increase in the civilian community, a soldier told Army senior leaders, during a town hall Wednesday at the annual meeting of the Association of the U.S. Army.

"In the last year, my rent has gone up and matched every single BAH increase so it's made no difference to my yearly income," said the soldier, based at Fort Carson, Colorado.

"Is there anything we're going to put in place to protect service members so they [don't have to] live paycheck to paycheck anymore?'

That housing allowance is a key financial component for military families, and over the last few years, service members have gotten boosts in pay and BAH to counter the increases in cost of living. "However, as soon as those pay increases are announced, the surrounding community increases the cost of living and the rent." said the soldier.

The senior leaders discussed some of their efforts across a myriad of areas to improve the lives of soldiers and families, including some areas where they need to push for change at the national level. Troops and families laid out some of their concerns, like the rent increases, to Secretary of the Army Christine Wormuth, Chief of Staff of the Army Gen. Randy George, and Sergeant Major of the Army Michael Weimer.

Information on military pay and BAH rates is public knowledge. The issue of how BAH rates affect the rental market in the local community has been brought up for decades, and has been periodically discussed by lawmakers and service officials, as well as how BAH rates are determined.

We talk about this all the time," said George, adding that he, too, has seen the lock-step increases happen in communities near installations. He added that the Army doesn't control the landlords who provide housing ... '

The pending cold: Why are we still falling back into darkness?

Those were cold, dark winter mornings during second semester of my freshman year in college, when my alarm woke me at 5:00 am for morning swim

relegated me to a dark, frozen corner of Hell. Light did not surface during winters in Ohio until I was back on my bike after morning practice, pedaling furiously to make my eight-o-clock class, my wet, chlorinated hair frozen into icicle

in 1985, the complete lack of sunlight

states (and other countries who'd enacted similar policies) have questioned the continued use of time changes. I'm with Ben. I don't want to "fall back" this November into darkness. I'd rather live in the sun, and plenty of others agree with me. In recent years, there have been efforts in the US to do away with our twice-yearly clock changes. Some states have enacted legislation to adopt permanent DST, and others have advocated to eliminate DST. Regardless of which side jurisdictions land, there seems to be a growing consensus that changing the time disrupts sleep, inconveniences farmers, and possibly increases incidences of suicide, accidents, criminal activity, stroke and heart attack. State legislatures have considered approximately 550 bills to make DST permanent, and nineteen states have conditionally enacted such laws. Only two states, Hawaii and Arizona, have never recognized DST, using an old loophole in the Uniform Time Act of 1966 to remain on Standard Time year round, arguing it's healthier and saves air conditioning costs.

Americans want it over 29% who want permanent Standard Time, then why do we still have to set our clocks back on November 5th this year? Because the feds won't allow states to adopt permanent DST until it says so. Senator Marco Rubio's 2022 Sunshine Protec-

Thankfully, I don't have to rise every winter morning at o-dark-thirty to ride my bike to swim practice anymore. I no longer wake before sunrise to pack three school lunches like I did for fifteen years at multiple duty stations. As an empty nester and "mature" retired military spouse, I can lallygag until the sun peeks over the horizon, unless our dog awakens me before dawn.

So regardless of the laws, the clocks can be damned. I choose to follow the sun, where ever and whenever it faithfully appears, shining its cheerful, uplifting rays of light.
